after tonight, remember my words, everything goes. You have been strong enough to handle what you've had to endure already. Nothing that is thrown at you in life is going to be something we cannot handle. Take comfort in the fact that you are strong enough and everything goes. Cherish what you have and live in the kindness moment."

Anna White, class Valedictorian, plans to attend Mississippi State University and play in the band. Anna began her speech by thanking family, friends and teachers for being there and supporting the entire class through the years.

"To my fellow graduates, thank you for making my high school experience great," Anna said. "I have made such good friends. I will always cherish my memories of my time spent at SGC and it's hard to believe that it's time to say goodbye."
