Mayberry recognized for service as Commissioner

At the October 11, 2021, meeting of the Alexander County Commissioners, former commissioner Ryan Mayberry, of Bethlehem, was presented a "Key to the County" for his 12 years of service on the board. He was first elected in 2008, and re-elected in 2012 and 2016. He served three years as chairman and four years as vice chairman. "Ryan only had one thing in mind during his time as a county commissioner - to make Alexander County a better community," Chairman Larry Yoder stated. Mayberry expressed his appreciation for the recognition from the board. He said, "Being a commissioner is a lot of work. People don't realize how much time it takes to do this job. It's not just meetings, but also many phone calls and emails, and planning for the future. We couldn't do any of it without our county employees. We have accomplished a lot of things. I would like to especially thank the citizens of Alexander County for allowing me to serve."

The Court of Honor was led by Scoutmaster Rob Duncan and members of troop 275. The two new Eagle Scouts in Troop 275 include Gavin Roupe and Jackson Reid, both of Bethlehem, NC. Gavin Roupe of Pleasant Gardens Drive in Bethlehem is the son of Fred and Jennifer Roupe and the brother of Tessa Roupe. He is a member of Boy Scout Troop 275, chartered to Mt. Pisgah Lutheran Church in Bethlehem. Gavin was pleased to have his father, Fred Roupe, as an assistant scoutmaster of the troop. To earn the rank of Eagle, Roupe completed 21 merit badges and demonstrated leadership and community service by organizing and carrying out an Eagle project.
