Work on New Tourist Camp is Progressing

Several - Tent Houses Completed and Road to Camp Finished Except For Surface Rock

Good progress is being made on the new tourist camp which the city is building on the new tract of city land south of the high school building, said City Engineer I. H. Mann today. The big septic tank has been completed and the plans prepared for the showers and toilets have been accepted by the city commission.

Several tent houses are already being constructed, which when completed will be occupied by employees of the city. As soon as all sanitary arrangements are complete the camp will be available for public use.

The road which is being constructed from the high school to the camp grounds is finished except for the surface coat of rock, and lateral roads are being constructed to form the streets of the camp.

SEATS BEING PLACED IN WEST-SIDE SCHOOL

Rapid progress is being made on the West Side school building, and 70 seats for pupils were installed Monday in rooms on the first floor which are ready for occupancy, and which will be used for school purposes at once.

Work on the second floor is rapidly nearing completion, and will be placed in service at the earliest possible moment, according to W. A. Boutwell of the local board of trustees.

When completed, the West Side school will increase the present school facilities here by six additional rooms.

October - New Beginnings

There are few older adults of that certain age that do not remember the opening lines of "In 1492."

"In fourteen hundred ninety-two

Columbus sailed the ocean blue."

Columbus, when he landed, thought he was in the Indies. But, Oops! He was in the crystal blue waters of what we call the Bahamas. For Columbus it was the New World. He made the mistake of calling the natives Indians.

The natives called the island Guanahani and Columbus renamed it San Salvador. After finding the New World, history began to change. Maybe, that was because Johannes Gutenberg had invented the printing press in 1450, the Facebook of yesteryear.

Martin Luther on October 31, 1517 changed religion as we knew it. He wrote the "95 Theses." This document was the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. To make his views known, he posted his document on the doors of the Wittenberg Palace Church. The Pope was not at all happy with Luther, questioning his authority, and ultimately excommunicated Luther.

To claim our freedom from England, for seven years the young country of America fought the American Revolution (1775-83). On October, 13, 1792, the first President, George Washington, placed the cornerstone for the new home for the President.

Designed by James Hoban, 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue, became the 'home' of the American people. It was burned by the British in 1814, but was rebuilt and painted white to cover the black scarring of fire marks. It became known as the White House.

For England, even after the American Revolution, Canada remained as a reminder to our North. On October 20, 1818, the now United States and Canada (England) agreed to set the border of Canada and the United States as the 49 degree parallel. "The Rainbow Bridge, Ontario is a demarcation."

On October 26, 1825, The United States dedicated the Erie Canal. Costing seven million dollars and taking eight years to build, the Erie Canal became the "first made-made waterway in America." It links Lake Erie with New York's Hudson River.

The single most important factor in the growth of our great country is/was communications. The phone was invented by Alexander Graham Bell on February 14, 1876.

On October 24, 1861, the first transcontinental telegram in America was sent from San Francisco, California to the White House and President Abraham Lincoln from Stephen J. Field, Chief Justice of

California. He thought "the new link would help the Western states stay loyal to the Union during the Civil War."

It was only two years later, on October 3, 1863, that President Lincoln signed the proclamation designating the last Thursday in November as Thanksgiving.

People identify death and destruction with war, but there were few events that caused the destruction, at that time, such as the Great Chicago Fire of October 8, 1871. The flames claimed the lives of 300 people and an estimated 17,450 homes. It is estimated that 900,000 were left homeless.

America has always been the "Mother of Exiles." Our doors are open to those wanting a better life. On October 28, 1886, to "commemorate the lasting friendships of France and the United States," one of the greatest gifts ever given, was The Statue of Liberty. It was dedicated to mark the 100th anniversary of the American Revolution. The statue was the work of Frederic Bathodi.

Wars have a way of changing a nation and its people. World War I (1914-1918) was such a war. On October 21, 1915, our world became a lot smaller, when the American Telephone and Telegraph Company sent the first Transatlantic Radio (voice) message from Virginia to Paris.

On October 6 1927, the first film that featured synchronized dialogue opened. The name of the 'movie' was the "Jazz Singer"

and featured the great Al Jolson.

Communication has become a way of life. On October 30, 1938, writer H.G. Wells and actor Orson Wells did a radio program called the "War of the Worlds." It was so well done that people listening thought that New Jersey was being invaded by Martians.

Hitler and the deadliest war in history touched the lives of 30 countries. World War II was a global war (1939-1945) and lives were forever changed.

On August 6 and 9, 1945, President Harry S. Truman ended World War II by dropping two atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. In October, 1945 The United Nation was founded.

On October 4, 1957, after Russia launched the first satellite into space. The United States sent Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin to the moon. These 'giants' of the space program became the first to walk on the lunar surface." The date was July 20, 1969.

October has always been a month of accomplishments and blessings. On October 4, 1965 - 56 years ago, Pope Paul VI became the first Pope to visit the United States and the first Pope to address the United Nation.

Using the words of the late assassinated President, John F. Kennedy, Pope Paul said... "Mankind must put an end to war, or war will put an end to mankind. Never Again!!!" Canonized on October 14, 2018, Pope Paul VI, will the people ever listen to the words of truth?
