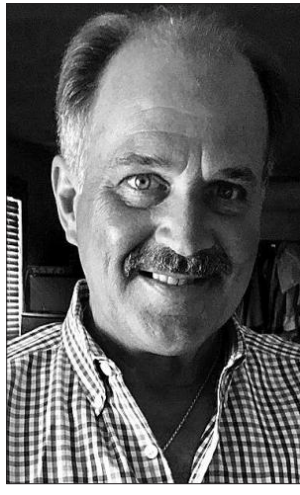
## Charles Keith Sebastian, 61

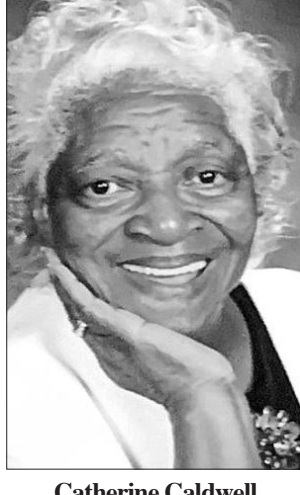
Services were held Sunday, Feb. 14, 2021 at the Ransdell Chapel on the campus of Campbellsville University.
