School for the Deaf, Green County students

Kentucky School for the Deaf at Danville was the first statesupported school of its kind in the US and the first school for the deaf west of the Allegheny Mountains. Education for the deaf was a special concern of State Senator Elias Barbee whose own daughter was deaf. In 1822, Barbee and John Rowan wrote legislation authorizing the school which was signed into law by Gov. John Adair.

When the first classes began in November 1823, seventeen pupils met in a former tavern. Most were in their late teens; the oldest was thirty and the youngest twelve years old. Lucy Barbee, born in Green County, daughter of Senator Barbee, was among those first students at the age of

It was not until 1884 that legislators took action for the education of deaf black students by the State. A new school was established on the same campus as the white school.

Tuition, books, and board were free to all students. They were taught by methods suited to their special needs by trained instructors. The course of study was practically the same as that of the public schools. An industrial department allowed older students to learn a trade by which they could support themselves after graduat-
