## **Kentucky ranks fourth on School Breakfast Participation**

## FEEDING KENTUCKY

The School Breakfast Program ensured 304,068 low-income students in Kentucky started their day ready to learn in the 2019-2020 school year, a 3.7% percent increase from the prior year according to the School Breakfast Scorecard, a report released by the Food Research & Action Center (FRAC). Nationally, 12.6 million low-income children received a free or reducedprice school breakfast on an average school day from September through February of the 2019–2020 school year.
