## Country Club rebuild in progress

A fire in November destroyed the Green County Country Club. Since then, volunteers with the club have been busy with all that comes with a catastrophic loss.

“Our club is fortunate to have a group of generous guys and girls dedicated to making this golf course and its new clubhouse one of the best in Central Kentucky,” Club president Blake Robertson said.

Plans for the new building took shape over the course of several weeks, according to board member Hayes Moore.

“My initial blueprint was compiled from research of dozens of clubhouses and I tried to come up with a plan that was modern, feasible and expandable,” Moore said. After considering multiple options and contractors, the Board selected Blevins Construction of Campbellsville, to build the new clubhouse.

Working closely with Rudy Renfrow of Blevins Construction, the final rendition made the cut with the following descriptive design:

The dining and bar area along with their accompanying porch area will be positioned overlooking the 9th green which should provide an impressive view.

Not only are golfers excited about the new clubhouse, longtime restaurant tenants E. Y. and Andi Henderson, share that sentiment.

and running,” E.Y. Henderson said. “We’ve missed our patrons and we hope this new building and its new kitchen will be inviting to both golfers and non-golfers alike.”

Construction has commenced with footers and concrete expected soon.

“We expect to be fully operational by Thanksgiving, but we’ve got our fingers crossed for Halloween,” Robertson said.

In the meantime, the club has its usual full schedule of golf events planned for the season and it has

built a mini-clubhouse quaintly named the “Back Porch Lite” for collection of greens fees, vending and bar services. Although the club won’t have its restaurant back until the fall, Robertson is confident the Back Porch Lite will provide a more than adequate spot to gather.

“It’s an exciting time for Green County with new construction happening all around town and we’re pleased to be a part of that progress,” Robertson said. “We believe good things are coming for our club and the county.”

The Green County Fiscal Court, in conjunction with the City of Greensburg, will be hosting the White Goods Amnesty Program this year, just in time for a thorough spring cleaning.

The event will be held Thursday, April 15 and Friday, April 16 from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. CT and Saturday, April 17 from 7 to 11 a.m.

Items may be dropped off at the old site of the Kentucky Burley Warehouse on Columbia Highway next to Access Cable.

Items accepted include appliances, furniture, batteries and various types of scrap metal. Items not accepted include paint, oil, tires, propane tanks, garbage, asphalt shingles, tree limbs, yard waste, lumber or any hazardous materials.

“Please do not bring items in an enclosed trailer,” Green County Judge-Executive John Frank said. “This greatly slows down the unloading process. We appreciate your cooperation.”
