What are you supposed to do with that white vaccination card you get after receiving a coronavirus vaccine? Should you laminate it? Will you need it again? What should you do if you lose it? And what's all this and more, after interviewing some experts.

What's the card for? These cards are your personal record of which vaccine you have had, much like your childhood immunization record, said Kelly Moore, deputy director of the Immunization Action

Creativity: Bringing awareness to Greensburg

The sidewalks in Greensburg got a little more colorful last week and all for a good cause.

April is Sexual Assault Awareness and Prevention Month. Members of the community rallied together to put it in the spotlight with a "Chalk the Walk" event hosted by the Silver Leaf Sexual Trauma Recovery Services in Elizabethtown.

Green County High School, Greensburg Police Department, Green County Sheriff's Office, Green County Attorney's Office and the Green County Judge's Office decorated sidewalks in front of their businesses to spread awareness about Sexual Assault and Prevention.

Studies show that every 73 seconds an American is sexually assaulted, and that one out of every six American women has been the victim of an attempted or completed rape in her lifetime, along with three percent of men who have experienced an attempted or completed rape in their lifetime.

Lindsay Landis, Green County Victims Advocate says these events are pivotal for awareness.

"Events like these are important to bring awareness to sexual assault and lessen the stigma that a victim might encounter," Landis said.

Corporal Carrie Ruth Davis and Officer Sara Coffman decorated the sidewalk in front of the Greensburg Police Department, along West Hodgenville Avenue, last Wednesday to show their support for Sexual Assault Awareness and Prevention Month.

"I was happy to be apart of this," said Coffman, "to help bring awareness to the importance of this month."

Davis shared the same sentiment and pride in the fact that the police department could participate.

"I think it's not only important to bring awareness to this month, but it's also important for people to see officers outside, in plain clothes, being a part of the community and encouraging people to speak up and speak out."

The Green County Sheriff's Office decorated the sidewalk in front of their office on Court Street with saying such as, "You are Worthy," and teal ribbons.

Deputy Adam Rainwater was outside using his skills to make the sidewalk a statement.

"The Green County Sheriff's Office was honored to participate in the event to spread awareness of sexual assault," Rainwater said. "The community needs to know that 'no means 'no'."

Rainwater also praised the Chalk the Walk event itself.

"These events are great for the community to help bring awareness and show support for those that are victims of sexual assault," he said. "We want people to know we are always here for you."
