

Congressman Guthrie gives update to Rotary Club

United States Representative Brett Guthrie spoke to the Greensburg Rotary Club last week, giving an update to what he sees going on in Washington, D.C.

Guthrie is the representative from Kentucky's Second District, which includes Green County. Guthrie resides in Bowling Green.

He reminded the Rotary Club and guests that the year had gotten off to a rough start with the January 6 invasion of the Capitol Building in Washington. Guthrie said that he was in his office

watching Senator McConnell on television when the building went on lockdown, causing what Guthrie called "a disgrace."

The West Point graduate, who has served as a U.S Representative since 2019, also spoke about the covid relief bill, which he said only contained about 9% of funds that truly went to covid re-

Guthrie said that he agreed that we need to be helping people who are down on their luck, businesses as well as individuals, but that the economy is growing.

"According to the April numbers," Guthrie said,



"there were 266,000 people who went to work but there were eight million jobs available."

Guthrie pointed out that

enhanced employment benefits are now set to go through September, but he also pointed out that some states are rejecting the enhanced employment benefits so that people have more incentive to go back to work instead of continuing to remain on unemployment. He said that for Kentucky, that is a decision that will need to come out of Frankfort in the governor's office.
