## The Cowherd Hotel House

A small part of Greensburg's history is the Cowherd Hotel. It was located at the present-day site of Limestone Bank on the corner of North Main Street and East Hodgenville Avenue.

The house that the hotel operated out of was first built as the residence of D. C and Mariah L. Blakeman in 1886. It was a large wood-frame two and a half story house with a front bay window and shingled roof.

Mariah L. Blakeman mortgaged her property June 1, 1894 in the amount of \$500. The record notes the house was occupied by R. T. Cowherd Esqr. and being used as a hotel. Mr. Cowherd was manager of the hotel and source of the establishment's name.

Just days after securing the mortgage, Blakeman sold her property to John Barnett. The transfer was official on October 1, 1894. A stove and two tables in the dining room of the hotel were also included in

Richard T. Cowherd would remain as manager at the hotel with a lease from its new owner. On the 1900 Census, he was listed as a Hotel Keeper in Greensburg, with his wife, Martha. Five boarders were staying at the hotel when the census was taken at the end of June. There were two widowed females, one male from Indiana whose occupation

was listed as foreman

at a stave factory, one

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male from Germany with no listed occupation, and one male from Russia working as a salesman.

During its time, the Cowherd Hotel hosted countless social events such as weddings, parties, and musical performances. It also served as a place of business. A dentist or doctor would occasionally set up there and advertise to see patients. An eveglasses salesman and music teacher even worked from the hotel for a time.

Following R. T. Cowherd's retirement in October of 1900, the Shreve brothers managed the hotel for several months, changing the name of the establishment to the Shreve Hotel. It was still often referred to as the Cowherd Hotel during that time and beyond. The Shreve family left the hotel business in August

In January 1902, John Barnett and his wife moved into the home they had owned since 1894. They continued renting out rooms. In June of that year, Woodson Lewis and his family took up residence there while their new home was being built just across the street.

John Barnett died at his home on Janu-

ary 17, 1915. He left his estate to his wife, Susan "Sunie" Barnett. At her death in 1930, the estate went to his sister Emily Green of Louisville and her daughters, Elizabeth and Dora Green.

In 1943, Dora and Elizabeth Green sold the property they had inherited in Greensburg to Miss Lizzie Mears, local farmer and businesswoman, for the sum of \$1. Miss Lizzie was about 75 years old. She lived there for a short time then sold to J. W. Coakley for \$1 in 1945.

Jim Will Coakley and his wife, Mallie, lived in the home on North Main Street. He passed away in 1948 at which time the property rights transferred to Mallie and their heirs.

Several years later, in 1969, the heirs sold the old hotel property to People's Bank Inc. for \$28,000 to be the site for a modern banking facility. The house, along with two others, was demolished to make way for the new bank which was completed in 1970.

The Cowherd Hotel house stood for 83 years and served many purposes over all that time. Maybe best of all, it was a home and a place of rest to many people while they were in our town.
