Angels unaware: 'The Prayer Boy Fund'

This story you are about to read has a beginning, but no ending.

During Cow Days 2021, like many other churches and organizations, Summer-shade United Methodist Church had a booth. Among the outreach possibilities was a prayer box. People were encouraged to write down their prayer concerns and place them in the box. Then, on Sunday the prayer requests would be taken to

the altar, prayed over, sight unseen, and then done away with.

However, there was one incident that caught the attention of the church workers. A youngster of about 10-11 years old expressed his deep concern over gun violence, threats, and dangers. He didn't elaborate, but it was obvious he was troubled by it. He wrote out his prayer concern and then did a most unusual thing. He wrapped the prayer request with a dollar bill. The workers told

him he didn't have to put any money with it. His reply was, "I know," but then he did it anyway.

The entire group was so struck by this, that a decision was made. The church would take the dollar and it to God and see what could happen from it. It would be known as the "prayer boy fund." It would be a mission fund used to help a child or children that might be caught in a needy situation. As of this moment, the fund has reached \$1,300. The

challenge continues.

The church has decided to share the funds equally between the Family Resource Center and the School Resource Officer. They would be able to use it at their discretion for possible needy situations.

At the present time, there is no knowledge of who the youngster is. We would surely like to know and be able to thank him for his concern and his gift.
