



## Cobb Salad

The Brown Derby restaurant is one of the most iconic images that became synonymous with the Golden Age of Hollywood. The restaurant opened in 1926 and was shaped like a man's derby hat. Due to its proximity to the movie studios, it was the place to make deals and to be seen. It contained hundreds of caricatures of famous movie and TV stars, as well as musicians who frequented the restaurant.

Late one evening in 1937, Bob Cobb, the owner of the Brown Derby was scouring the refrigerator for a snack. He grabbed a head of iceberg lettuce, an avocado, some Romaine lettuce, watercress, tomatoes, a cold breast of chicken, chives, a boiled egg, bleu cheese, and some French dressing. He took some cooked bacon from one of the chefs and started chopping.

He laid each ingredient in a bowl in rows. He shared the salad with his friend, Sid Grauman, owner of the famous Grauman's Chinese Theatre, who came back the following day and asked for a "Cobb Salad". It was added to the menu and became an overnight sensation. Customers began to flock to the restaurant for the salad. Movie stars and studio movie moguls would send their limousines and chauffeurs to the restaurant to pick up the salad if they couldn't go out to dine.

Today the Cobb Salad is still found on many menus.

Substitutions have been made. Additional cheeses and proteins have been added, as well as a variety of vegetables.

The Brown Derby restaurant is also the birthplace of the Shirley Temple, a non-alcoholic beverage created for the child star. When she was young, Shirley Temple often attended parties with the adult celebrities. Because she couldn't drink, a mocktail was created for her.

Today I have recipes for these 2 iconic mainstays of The Brown Derby restaurant, plus one of my own. Thanks for reading.

### SHIRLEY TEMPLE

In a Tom Collins or tall, narrow highball glass filled with ice, pour 1 oz. grenadine syrup and top with 4 oz. Sprite or Ginger Ale. Garnish with a maraschino cherry.

\*For a Dirty Shirley Temple: add 1 oz. vodka.

### COBB SALAD with BROWN DERBY FRENCH DRESSING

Dressing:  
 ½ cup red wine vinegar  
 ½ cup water  
 ½ cup vegetable oil  
 1/3 cup olive oil  
 1 Tbsp. lemon juice  
 1 ½ tsp. Worcestershire sauce  
 1 clove garlic, minced  
 1 tsp. salt  
 1 tsp. pepper  
 ½ tsp. sugar  
 ½ tsp. dry mustard  
 Combine all ingredients in a bowl (or Mason Jar) and stir (or shake) until dressing is smooth. Refrigerate.

Salad:  
 1 head iceberg lettuce  
 1 bunch watercress,

trimmed and chopped  
 3 tomatoes, chopped  
 ¼ lb. sliced deli turkey meat, diced  
 3 hard boiled eggs, chopped  
 ¾ cup crumbled blue cheese  
 ½ lb. cooked bacon, crumbled  
 2 avocados, diced  
 Place chopped lettuce and watercress in a large salad bowl. Arrange tomatoes, turkey, eggs, blue cheese, bacon, and avocados on top. Add desired amount of dressing before serving and toss.

### SALMON COBB SALAD

Dressing:  
 ¾ cup buttermilk  
 ½ cup mayonnaise  
 ¼ cup minced green onion  
 3 Tbsp. chopped fresh dill  
 1 Tbsp. lemon juice  
 ½ tsp. salt  
 Mix all ingredients and refrigerate.

Salad:  
 1 head lettuce  
 ½ lb. cooked bacon, cut into pieces  
 1 avocado, cut into ½ inch pieces  
 3 hard boiled eggs, quar-

## Mississippi man to get lost class ring after nearly 30 years

A Philadelphia, Mississippi man is set to be reunited with a class ring he lost almost 30 years ago.

Jaimee Kelley said she found the ring back in 2013 while walking in her yard at her home on Hwy 19 in eastern Attala County near the

Four Corners community. It was a Philadelphia High School ring from the class of 1990.

At the time, she posted it on Facebook, but no one claimed it, so she put it away, but recently came across it.

"Cleaning stuff out, I found it again and cleaned more dirt off of it and thought I could post it again and see where it could go," said Kelley.

Kosciusko resident Kaitlyn Chunn saw the post and tagged the legendary Philadelphia football star Marcus Dupree, who her father used to coach, in the shared post.

"My dad keeps in touch with Marcus all the time, so I thought that surely he would know who to contact," Chunn said.

Dupree gave her a name and eventually they located the ring's owner, Jerremey Willis.

Willis said that he lost the ring in the summer of 1991 during a wreck on Highway 19 between Kosciusko and

Philadelphia, near the site of Kelley's current day home.

"When the car finally stopped and landed, I got out and thought I was walking towards Philadelphia, but it turns out I was walking towards Kosciusko," Willis said. "The wreck happened at about 2 a.m. and no one located me until about 10 a.m. that morning. It was a miracle I walked away at all."

Somewhere in all of that commotion is when the ring was lost.

"What's funny is that about three weeks ago, my mother showed me pictures she found from the wreck and we actually talked about me losing the ring."

A friend texted him a picture of the ring on Facebook and told him to get in touch with Chunn.

Willis lives in Georgia now so Chunn took the ring to his mother in Philadelphia Thursday afternoon.

"It just brings back so many memories. To see the emblem and my name on it."

Willis says he plans to be back in Philadelphia next weekend to get the ring.

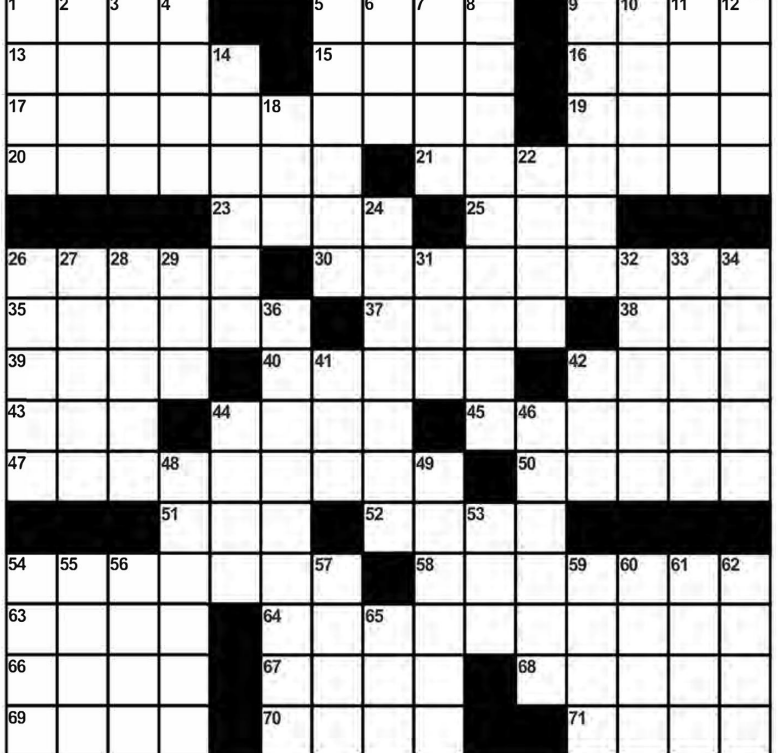
