To achieve the nationwide goal of reducing new HIV infections in the United States by 75% by the year 2025 and 90% by the year 2030, the Center for Disease Control's Ending the HIV Epidemic: A Plan for America focuses on four key strategies and steps that together can end the HIV epidemic in the U.S. The four-step approach op-

erates as follows: * Diagnose all individuals with HIV as early as possible after infection.

* Treat people with HIV pression.

* Prevent new HIV transinterventions, including preexposure prophylaxis and syringe services programs.

* Respond quickly to poprevention and treatment services to people who need them.
