What was the hardest part of working at the clinic during the past year of COVID?

- The unknown. I remember being really, really afraid of seeing patients initially when COVID first began. Nobody really knew what it looked like, who was susceptible, or how fast it would spread.
- Not being able to go to the nursing homes to see our patients who reside there to provide their care.
- Just making sure that people get the care they need while maintaining safety for other staff and patients has been challenging.
- Having to put signs up at the front door to DO NOT ENTER unless you have an appointment. It was very hard to send this message to our

patients and others who we normally warmly welcome into our place of work

- Not being able to be face-to-face with our patients—we missed them.
  Not seeing smiles on peoples' faces due to everyone needing to wear masks.
- Trying to stay safe and healthy to be able to stay open and have a safe and healthy environment for those we are able to care for.
- Patients getting angry with us about things out of our control and the "rules" we need to enforce.
- Honestly, I think the hardest part of working during this past year was the skepticism of some people. When you ask that someone put their mask on and they roll their eyes because they don't believe that COVID-19 is an actual health crisis. I have seen what COVID can do to people. I have seen the lingering effects long after one has "recovered". COVID-19 is scary, it is real, and it doesn't care if you believe.
- It has also been a challenge just to continue our day-to-day operations. Just making sure that people get the care they need while maintaining safety for other staff and patients has been challenging.
