IMPORTANT PROPERTY TAX HOMESTEAD NOTICE

* This will affect your 2022 property taxes and eligibility for Property Tax Refund.

Have you purchased or moved into a property in the past year?

Contact your county assessor to file a homestead application if you or a qualifying relative occupy the property as a homestead on or before December 31 2021.

What is a qualifying relative?

For unoccupied agricultural property, a qualifying relative includes the child, grandchild, sibling, or parent of the owner or owner's spouse.

For occupied agricultural or residential property, a qualifying relative also includes the owner's uncle, aunt, nephew, or niece.

When do I apply?

You must apply on or before December 31, 2021.

Once homestead is granted, annual applications are not necessary unless they are requested by the county assessor.

Contact the assessor by December 31, 2021 if the use of the property you own or occupy as a qualifying relative has changed during the past year.

If you sell, move, or for any reason no longer qualify for the homestead classification, you are required to notify the county assessor within 30 days of the change in homestead status.

ty's notice that snow removal service will no longer be provided because the City is not paying its bills. That the resident supported Boy River Township becoming the local unit of government, saying that would allow more people to participate in the government. They also noted that fire numbers are currently not present within the city limits.

Stevenson noted that two Boy River Township Supervisors and the Town Clerk were present at the meeting. Those supervisors expressed a willingness to accept the city as part of the township if that was the residents' desire, and to begin the process to dissolve the City of Boy River.

County Attorney Ben Lindstrom and Elections Administrator Pamela Smith explained to those present the process required to formally dissolve the city. First they need to create a petition that will need to be signed by at least three registered voters of the city in support of the dissolution.

Smith said that she would send a sample petition to the Town Clerk, and explained that once the petition was complete it should be sent back to her, after which she would send it on to an Administrative Law Judge to have a date, time and fee set for a hearing to dissolve the city. She said the judge's fees may be covered by the League of Minnesota Cities or Association of MN Counties, and advised the Township to investigate. She also advised the Township to reach out to the MN Secretary of State to request a list of registered voters for the City of Boy River to complete the petition.

practice, in place since 2007, has been to offer monthly timber auctions consisting of four oral timber auctions and eight sealed bid timber auctions in a calendar year. He said that due to the Covid pandemic, the in-person oral auctions were replaced with sealed bid auctions. On July 29, there were 20 logging contractors present at the bid opening. When asked, 14 were in favor of holding more oral auctions and five wanted the auction calendar to remain the same. However, at the oral timber auction held on October 28, there was no opposition received from logging contractors to the proposed change.

Titus also noted that the

Environmental Services

Environmental Services Director John Ringle presented a Transfer Station Feasibility Study Cost Update for board consideration. He has received a cost estimate for hourly billing, not to exceed \$2,500, from Martin Mechanical to update the current cost estimate tables for developing a plan and request for CAP bonding in 2022 to rebuild the Pine River Transfer Station Solid Waste Recycling Facility. The facility's two buildings, Cardboard and Household Hazardous Waste, are both over 30 years old.

Ringle said the updated figures were needed due to fluctuations in building material prices, and the updated cost estimate was needed for the proposal. He reported that the update is only for the preferred option. The board approved his request.

They also approved a County Construction and Titus noted that current Demolition Landfill Feasibility Study grant proposal. Ringle reported that this study will address an issue common to most rural counties, and that Cass County has received an invitation to be part of a consortium



the looming issue of declining space for unlined C&D landfills in all nine counties, and noted that there was an indication that permits would not be renewed for expansion on new landfills unless they are lined and have extremely expensive leachate collection. Many existing landfills are nearing capacity and many permits will not be renewed. Many counties operate countyowned C&D landfills, but Cass is unique in that it has four privately-owned landfills, all of which are nearing capacity and their permits may not be renewed when they expire. Ringle told the board he would like Cass County to join this consortium to develop a grant proposal to MPCA for a Feasibility Study to plan for a regional site(s) for a lined C&D Landfill and a collection system to reduce the distance C&D waste must be hauled.
