PUBLIC NOTICE

Notice of Application for National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System Permit to Discharge Treated Wastewater Into Waters of the State of Georgia.

The Georgia Environmental Protection Division has received a new NPDES permit application for the reissuance of an existing NPDES permit. Having reviewed such application, the Environmental Protection Division proposes to issue for a maximum term of five years the following permit subject to specific pollutant limitations and special conditions:

City of Lincolnton, Post Office Box 489, Lincolnton, GA 30817, NPDES Permit No. GA0049450, for the Lincolnton Water Pollution Control Plant located at 1183 Mitchell Lane, Lincolnton Georgia 30817. Up to 0.52 MGD of treated wastewater is being discharged to Reedy Creek in the Savannah River Basin. The draft permit also includes effluent limitations and monitoring requirements for the expanded flow of 1.04 MGD.

Persons wishing to comment upon or object to the proposed determinations are invited to submit same in writing to the EPD address below, or via e-mail at EPDcomments@dnr.ga.gov, no later than thirty (30) days after this notification. If you choose to e-mail your comments, please be sure to include the words "NPDES permit reissuance – Lincolnton Water Pollution Control Plant – GA0049450 (Lincoln County)" in the subject line to ensure that your comments will be forwarded to the correct staff. All comments received prior to or on that date will be considered in the formulation of final determinations regarding the application. A public hearing may be held where the EPD Director finds a significant degree of public interest in a proposed permit or group of permits. Additional information regarding public hearing procedures is available by writing the Environmental Protection Division.

Fisheries strategies shift from Christmas trees to bamboo

The Forest, Fish, and Wildlife Section at the J. Strom Thurmond Lake Project has shifted its fisheries management strategies of old from using recycled Christmas trees for habitat enhancement to new habitat enhancement of bank, fishing piers, and deep-water attractor sites with bamboo.

The technique was adopted from the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources. Golden Bamboo (*Phyllostachys aurea*) is a non-native, exotic bamboo species found around the southeastern U.S. that invades many habitat types, including those on Thurmond Lake.

To combat the spread of the non-native species and repurpose its negative characteristics into positive, this species is being used as fish habitat enhancement and attractors. Compared to other natural and artificial attractors, bamboo boasts many benefits, including being composed of natural materials, having a resistance to decay, exhibiting a vertical and horizontal structure profile, and having a guaranteed upright stationary position.

These factors translate into a greater longevity (more than eight years) and the ability to attract game and non-game fish species.

Christmas trees will still be recycled and repurposed as a benefit to anglers.

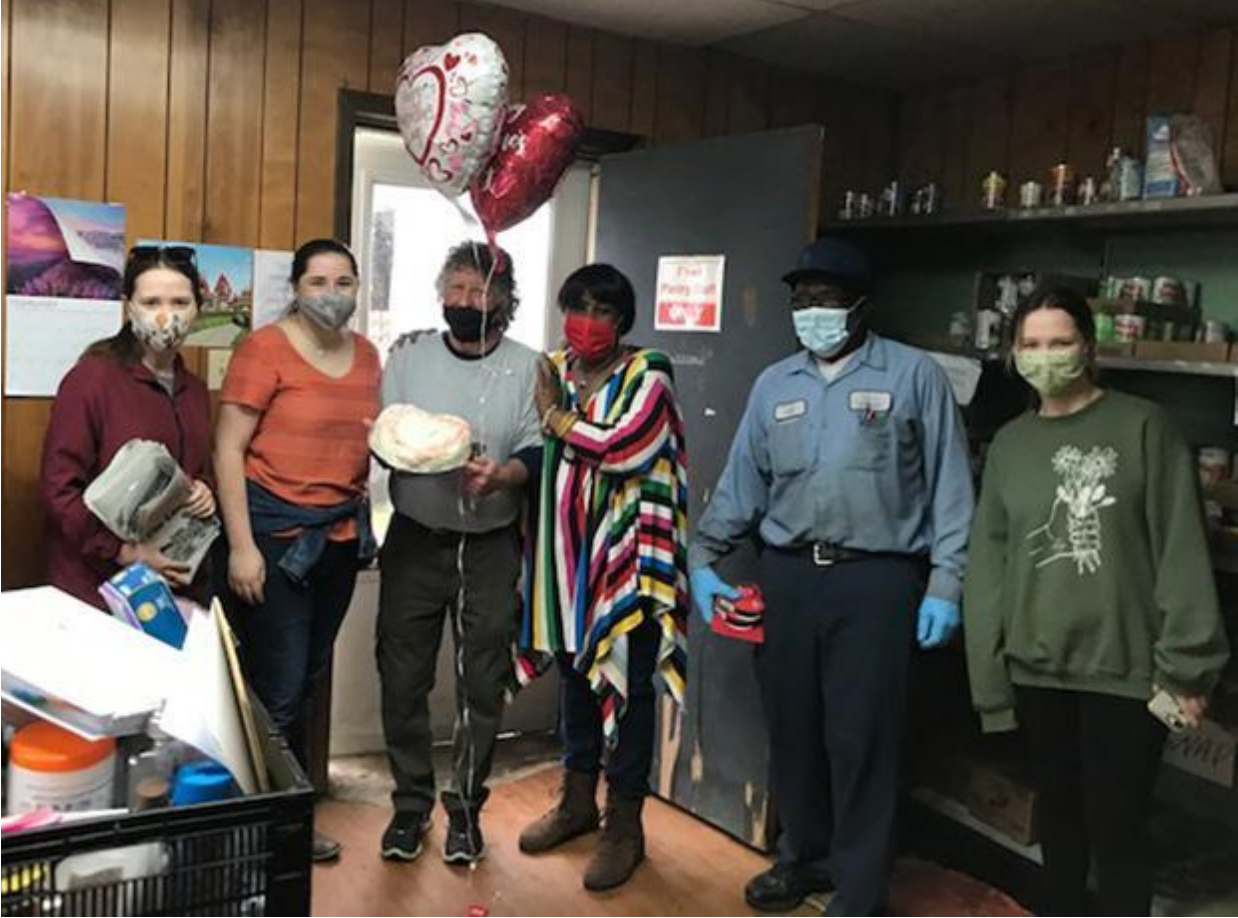
"We're working hand-in-hand with the public to recycle and create positive benefits for the enhancement of the fisheries at Clarks Hill (Thurmond) Lake," Conservation Biologist Evan Brasher said.
