Collinsville looks forward to return of Italian Fest

People in Collinsville love to claim a little Italiano heritage around this time of year.

The annual Italian Fest, an event that typically draws thousands of people to downtown, returns after a hiatus brought on by Covid-19. The party along Main Street takes place Friday and Saturday, Sept. 17 and 18. Jeree Bronnbauer said last

year's cancellation brought on by the pandemic was a hard pill to swallow.

"That was a very big deal, and a lot of people were very disappointed," she said.

She is co-chairing the event with Carrie Cushing, who served as chair in 2019 and was supposed to turn over the reins to Bronnbauer this past year. They determined it best to team up for this year's event. Bronnbauer had been the decorating chair for Italian Fest since 2009.

The specter of health concerns still hovers, she said.

"We keep in touch with the Madison County Health Department. If the numbers get high, we will scale back on some events. But right now, as long as the numbers are controllable, we can move forward."

The festival has events throughout the two days, starting at 11 a.m. Friday and continuing until 10 p.m. Saturday. A 5K run will be held at 8 a.m. on Saturday.

The Bocce Ball Tournament, which is held off site at Glidden Park, is one of the most popular of the events. It takes What is traditionally one of the largest local parades in the state is set to occur at 4 p.m. Saturday, starting on Main Street at North Hesperia Street. The route takes entrants down Main Street



to Clay Street where the Fest grounds start. From there it proceeds to Seminary Street then hooks back around to Clay Street, following the one-way patterns.

Vendors are expected to be plentiful, with many Italian specialities, hosted by nonprofit groups and others.

The music schedule was still being assembled, but local well-known bands are already committed, including Champagne Fixx, JustIn Time, Blue Marlin, Electrik Baby Power and Derrick Keith.

The Italian Fest began in 1984 and except for last year has continued annually.

Several businesses get behind Italian Fest. They are listed as "platino, oro, argento and bronzo," or platinum, gold, silver and bronze. Platino sponsors include Laura Buick, Grey Eagle Distributors, Koerner Distributor Inc., and Robert "Chick" Fritz Inc.

place all day on Saturday, the 18th. The Italian lawn bowling game is fun for both the participants and the spectators. Registration begins at 9 a.m.

The Grape Stomp is also popular, pitting politicians, bankers and others in a friendly bit of pressing horseplay. The more stomping, the more covered they get. (And they don't keep the juice.) The Stomp begins at 11:30 a.m. following opening ceremonies. and our nonprofits and keep them going as long as we can," Bronnbauer said.

Madison County Transit will supply complimentary transportation to the Italian Fest both days. People can catch the shuttle at Doris Intermediate School, 1841 Vandalia St., to take to the festival grounds in Uptown Collinsville. The return shuttle will pick passengers up at Clay Street and return to Doris Intermediate School.
