"This event features an impressive display of artic-themed recycled art sculptures created by local students and civic groups, train rides for kids, family crafts, and of course – Santa!" spokeswoman Kate Allaria said. Professional photos with Santa are available with pre-booking to ensure proper social distancing. Event tickets are \$5 per person (2 and under are free). Participants may book photos and purchase tickets on the Children's Museum website.

The museum is partnering with the Edwardsville Arts Center, Republic Services, and Cardinal Buick to bring the event to the community.

The Artic Express day will also feature train rides; hot cocoa and cookies; a craft table where kids can make food for Santa's reindeer; and a professional chainsaw artist carving a tree in the Discovery Garden.

Also making plans during the holiday — and for a need that continues all year long — is the **Glen-Ed Pantry**, 125 Fifth Ave.


"We have a number of upcoming programs we are asking the community to support us in," said Director of Development Jane Balsters Ahasay.
