## Jr. Lady Vikings have strong start to season

The wild card this season so far has been Sabryna Day and she has taken steps in the right direction, bringing leadership and knocking down key buckets for the Jr. Lady Vikings. At Lake County, McLemore was injured and Day had to stay on the floor extended minutes, leading the team to a road victory.

this season so far," Coach Green said. "I have a couple of buddies that run an AAU program and I push all my players to play in the summer. That has helped the entire team all the way around. The summer program took the girls to Georgia, Indiana and even close to home in Memphis, Tenn. Having success in the summer builds confidence while also keeping the skillset crisp for the upcoming season. This past summer, all the 8th graders participated in the AAU program."

There has been a change to the coaching staff for the Jr. Lady Vikings. When a coach like Kierra Dotson has to step away, one might worry about the role she so adequately filled last year. But with the news of coach Chandra Maclin returning to the sidelines, those worries quickly dissipate.

Coach Green remarked, "I was her assistant coach for two years when she

was the varsity coach here in Humboldt. It's a little bit like bad cop, good cop. It works out pretty good. We miss coach K. a lot. And I still can call her at any time, and she will show up and do whatever she needs to do to help us."

Coach Dotson has a daughter (Jailyn Dotson) and can be found in the stands most any game the Jr. Lady Vikings are on the court.

This team looks hungry to get back to the game they were in last year. It felt like the final game of last season just slipped through their fingers as Humboldt did not play to their fullest potential.

When asked about how to keep the team focused, Coach Green said, "We talk about one day at a time. Let's make sure we do what we are supposed to do every day at practice. They are working hard. They surprised me a little bit. I'm an in your face kind of a coach. My eighth graders are picking up that role on the court to the point where I don't have to say as much. They want it real bad. They talk about it all the time. I just keep telling them we need to make sure we are getting better each day in practice. January is coming and we are going to play. But we have to get our reserves ready to play because you never know when someone might get in foul trouble and we are going to need them seventh graders to step up. So they are pushing themselves every day to get better."

There have been a few games already this season where the game was iced and the players on the bench were able to show what they are able to do and get some experience. The main focus of improvement is lifting their basketball IQ.

Last season, the team was mostly seventh graders with the exception of two players. It is going to be a fun stretch as we march toward post-season play.
