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their opening jamboree at George County and defeated the 5A Vancleave Bulldogs 4-3 to open the regular season in dramatic fashion. A walk-off single from Brewer in the bottom of the seventh capped off an exciting return to action in front of a large home crowd at Scott Bray Field.

Chatham's team didn't have their heads in the clouds for too long though as they suffered their first loss later that same evening in the second game of a double-header against the Oak Grove Warriors. Mistakes plagued GCHS in that game and the 6A Warriors took full advantage, blowing open a close game for a lopsided win.

That loss, while bitter for him and his team, will pay dividends down the road, Chatham believes.

"We purposely put together one of the toughest schedules in the state," he said. "We want to play the best competition we can. That's our mindset because we know it will prepare us for the big games that will come later in the year."

"When you play the teams we play, you learn really quickly that you can't take a single pitch for granted."

Chatham said he and his players embrace any opportunities they're given to take on top-tier competition in preparation for their run through region play in March and April. And, that was a big part of the reason for Chatham's scheduling of a week-long tournament that brought the likes of Pascagoula, Vancleave, Oak Sumrall and Grove, Lumberton to the Wildcats' complex and finished with a trip to Biloxi for a chance to play at MGM Park.

"We put feelers out there for good programs that we had relationships with, and it came together better in the first year than I expected," Chatham said. "When vou have good teams involved, most people want to be a part of that. And we wanted to have it finish up at MGM Park to make it something special for those that participated."

They dropped a 6-2 decision to Gautier in their final game of the tournament at Scott Bray Field on Feb. 18, but bounced back from the loss to

the Warriors with a lopsided win over Lumberton at MGM Park the next day.

The Wildcats carried that momentum to Petal a few days later and came away with a 4-2 road win over the Panthers. They followed up last weekend with a mercyrule win over Columbia in five innings and had George County on the ropes on Saturday, but a couple of illtimed miscues allowed the Rebels to have a big fifth inning and steal a win.

"The George County loss was a tough one because I think we got a bit complacent with the lead and just didn't finish," Chatham said. "We pitched well enough and swung the bat well enough, but just didn't do what we needed to seal the win."


"But, that too will be a learning opportunity."


Along with this week's series with FCAHS, the Wildcats will also tangle with West Marion, make a trip to Sumrall and take on Florence at Jones College before kicking off four straight weeks of region play in mid-March. The remainder of the nonregion schedule includes a stint in the Stringer Tournament, a matchup with an always-tough Taylorsville team and a trio of 2-game series with Magee, East Central and West Jones.

Their journey to reach the playoffs will look a little different this time around as Greene County will be competing in the newly-aligned Region 8-4A, which will pit them against Pass Christian, Bay High, Stone County and Moss Point in that order.


Stone boasted a 25-8 recor through a phenomenal 2021 season that ended with an appearance in the 4A South State championship series. That was last year and there is opportunity for any team in the region to assert itself as the team to beat in 2022. Having paid their dues and prepared tirelessly throughout the offseason, West said he sees no reason that it can't be the Wildcats.
