Even on the occasions when batters put the ball into play, they're still going to have a hard time reaching base safely. The Lady Cats' pitchers will receive support from an experienced group of fielders, all starting with senior standout shortstop CharLee Meadows.

Meadows had a big 2021, receiving All-Region honors and committing to play at the next level for Pearl River Community College. She occasionally plays third base as well, and has quite the knack for making a huge impact on games from either spot.

"CharLee is a grind-it-out type of player who brings a lot to the table," Barham said. "She has a magnetic personality and is extremely gritty. She's the type of player you want who always leaves the field with a dirty uniform. We're so happy to have her."

Just to Stewart's left will be junior Jalon Walley at second base, and much like Stewart she has the ability to make plays from nearly anywhere in the infield whenever her number is called upon to do so. To the right at third base will be junior Breeze Jordan, who brings experience to the field gained through 19 games in the defensive lineup during her sophomore campaign.

First base will be covered by several different Lady Cats, depending on who takes the mound to pitch. Brewer brings the most experience to the position, while Stewart and Erin Meadows have also proven to be reliable starters whenever Brewer is called upon in the pitching circle. Replacing last year's senior catcher Tiana Caver will be eighth-grader Kambrie Lawrence, who was selected to the All-Region squad as a seventh-grader and hopes to


