The Greene County High School Marching Pride band is under new direction this year, with incoming band director James Thornton.

He said he is working to grow the band, and he hopes to find a few students that play those non-traditional marching band instruments, such as piano and guitar.

Band members met the last two weeks of July for their annual band camp, and during that time, they worked on putting together this year's halftime show, working on the fundamentals of marching and learning a few new tunes. For some former GCHS marching band members, one tune should be a bit nostalgic. Thornton said Mississippi composer Greg Fiaris, who wrote the original GCHS Fight Song in the 1990s, has helped restore the song, as it has been changed a few times throughout the years.

"I called Greg (Fiaris) and asked if he still had the original file for the Fight Song," Thornton said, "and he did. I got it all put back together, and we will play the original song this year."

"We've been working on the fundamentals of marching. It's to help keep them from getting injuries when keeping their instruments,

bodies and feet all in sync." Not only did Fiaris help restore the old Fight Song, he also wrote an all original program for the band's halftime show. Thornton said to help make learning the show easier for band members, GCHS Principal Scott Bray purchased a computer program that will map each student's coordinates on the field, for each move, and it lets them know how many steps to take in between sets. Thornton said the program was helpful throughout band camp, and the group put in a lot of effort to

pull together as much as they could before the first days of school.

"They've been working hard," Thornton said. "I wasn't anticipating working on the show until school started because I wasn't sure what I had, but it's been a great camp."


