For Dungan, this year's Wildcat offense, with a more deliberate pace in a modified spread attack, is right down his alley.

"We've started using more power-running, downhill stuff and meshing it with (King's) West Coast background," said Dungan "We're tight end, H-back type, with only two wideouts, and I'm more familiar with that scheme."

"We base it around being fundamentally sound up front, playing quick off the ball, being aggressive. I think we're always going to be that kind of run-downhill type team, regardless of how many times a game we throw the ball."

Prentiss graduated from GCHS in 2009, returned as an assistant after college and has steadily worked his way into a more responsible position.

"After I finished up college, a job for a teacher came open here, and I was able to come back and coach under Coach Ainsworth," said Prentiss. "And Coach King was here before I graduated, so I knew him as well."

"It's a true blessing to work for him; he's a great guy. We have a lot of experienced guys on our staff, but we also have some younger guys like myself. We have a good group

Prentiss is in the unique posi-Gary, who has head coaching experience and was longtime high school assistant and middle school coach.

And he's not the only former Wildcat on staff at Greene County. Cam Dunnam and Garrett West are also young coaches who have returned to the program.

"It's a good blend," said Dungan. "We've been able to get some former players in and help them get started in this profession. They're workers, and that's what I tell them they need to do."

"Good coaches build their reputation on hard work. These guys are willing to do whatever needs to be done. At the end of the day, when we walk out of here and we're all on the same page, that's all that matters."

Other young assistants on the Wildcat staff include Kaelin Moore, Hayden West and Lee Hill, along with veteran David Tadlock.


