OKC Police needing manpower more than new stations

here may not be plans for a new Police Station in the west Oklahoma City area, but that doesn't hinder the OKC Police Department's operations.

Sgt. Gary Knight, the Assistant Public Information Officer with the OKC Police Department, said the location of the stations doesn't mean much for the areas the officers cover.

"Having a new station out there (west OKC) doesn't really mean that there would be more officers out there," Knight said. "That's just where officer's meet at the beginning and end of their shift."

"Right now, we have a fairly new one out there already, our southwest briefing station, which is out at 55th and South Portland, and then we just built a new hangar out there right beside it for our helicopter," Knight said. "But as far as building a new physical station out there, there are

no plans at this time that I'm aware of."

Knight said the extra stations wouldn't change the manpower, either. The crux of the OKC Police Departments current problem is the manpower on hand.

That can impact numbers of patrol officers in a given area, depending on the time of day and the staffing levels within the moment. The officers have to devote more resources to specific areas of town, meaning others will inevitably have less

With that being the case, OKC police officers still address all areas of the city as needs arise.

"We are always looking to hire more officers," Knight

Staff levels fluxuate monthly, with officers retiring and academy's graduating. In total, there are about 1,000 officers in the force. That counts detectives, specialized units and more. The OKCPD is authorized up to 1,200-1,300



"Just be cause they (people in the city) don't have a briefing station in their neighborhood, doesn't mean that they receive less attention than areas that do have a briefing station," Knight said. 'It's the same number of manpower... That wouldn't make any difference, but we do everything that we can to not only address the crime needs in the community, but to partner with the community to help address crime."
