




David Gentry

David Gentry served in the Navy for 11 years, three months and 20 days during the Vietnam War. Gentry was recruited in May of 1967 and was sent home May of 1971. He served as an Aviation Boatswain's Mate, working in the fuels sector on the USS Kitty Hawk Battleship. Gentry also fought in the Tet Offensive of 1968. The warship was given her name from Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, where the famous flight of the Wright Brothers took place in December of 1903. To give a better idea of how enormous the battleship was, Gentry shared that each of the front two anchors weighed 16,000 pounds. "It is unimaginable how big the ships are without actually seeing one". He shared that he experienced his most eye-opening and beautiful moments during his time in the Navy. In loving memory to his wife of 47 years, Glenda Gentry, who stayed as his soul mate before, during, and after his time of service.




Matthew J. De Toy

James D. Wyatt

Although years have passed, the Korean War has not been forgotten by the remaining soldiers and their families. The family of Army Master Sgt. James D. Wyatt will always remember their father as their hero.

"You hear about heroes in movies and on the news, but my dad is the only hero I have truly ever known," said Deborah Lemieux, daughter of Wyatt.

For his heroic achievement on September 5, 1950, he was awarded the "Bronze Star" in San Antonio.

The certificate reads, "While in the vicinity of Changwon, Korea, while engaged in combat with the enemy and intense enemy machine gun, automatic weapons, and small arms fire continually and with complete disregard for his own safety by exposing himself to enemy fire in order to secure more advantageous position for his platoon. Wyatt's trained initiative and coolness under fire is indicative of a well-trained soldier and brings credit to himself, his unit, and the military service."

Wyatt enlisted at 17 years old in 1947 and served for 21 years. When retired from service he worked at Tinker until his second retirement in 1992.

Time has come and gone since Wyatt's and several soldiers' actions in the Korean War, but their selflessness will never be forgotten.
