Up A Lazy River

Florida has a weblike network of nearly 1,700 rivers. If you want to go "Up A Lazy River," your home state is a good place to start.

One thousand seven hundred rivers is nothing to the 12,000 rivers that Alaska has and they make up 40 percent of the nation's surface water.

But, "Florida's rivers and waterways have carried the lifeblood of commerce to and for Florida's first settlers." The rivers, lakes and seashores of Florida are some of the most exciting and beautiful in this world.

Many of the rivers go unmentioned because they are hard to pronounce. Did you know the following rivers are on the west coast of Florida? Withlacoochee (near Lakeland), Pithlacha-sotee is just north of Tampa. The Caloosahatchee is a very important river. It connects Lake Okeechobee to Fort Myers and the Gulf of Mexico.

The names of the ones most difficult to pronounce are Indian names that lived in those areas of Florida. A good example is the Caloosahatchee. The river is named for the Caloose

Indians. They were a fierce and skilled warrior Indian who attacked the Spanish as they came ashore in the Fort Myers area. At one time, at their height, there were over 50,000 Caloosa Indians.

There are not too many elementary school children that do not know that the State river of Florida is the Swannee River. Stephen Foster's "Old Folks at Home" made Florida and the river popular. Since 1935, it has been our State song.

On the east coast of Florida, we are able to enjoy the scenic beauties of the St. Lucie and the Indian River. Just south of Fort Pierce, is a little town that time has forgotten, one mile west of Midway is a park that allows you to enjoy 'old Florida.'

Those coming to Florida down Route #1 trip over Florida's longest river, the 310 mile St. John's River flowing 'north' from Jacksonville to Lake George near Daytona.

On the panhandle of Florida are two important rivers. (Watch the names!) Apalachicola and the Ochlocknee River. The Apalachicola is approximately four miles wide and 160

miles long. Not only does this river bisect Florida and comes from southern Georgia, it is an excellent example of "Florida Forever."

What is "Florida Forever?" It was a conservation program begun by Jeb Bush in 1999. It is a program that purchases land to protect it for the people of Florida. As of July 2020, with a price tag of 3.1 billion dollars, the DEP (Florida Department of Environment), with the governor and his/her serving cabinet serve as the trustee. They have acquired 869,477 acres of land which is in trust for the residents of Florida.

With a population of 21.78 million residents and 3.5 million winter guests, it is difficult to share the importance Florida at its best. It doesn't take long to find some of the world's finest beaches and there are not many states with anywhere close to the number of golf courses. Does anyone not know that Disney World is in Florida?

But, for those who seek to discover the past and old Florida, need only to find a map or Google Florida Rivers and there is an adventure waiting for you.
