state-of-the-art of what an ICU room should be...to expand them," he said.

Branco called on Dr. Rick Miles, and RCH Chief of Staff Dr. Leann Dalton Cooper, who attended the meeting, to verify the need for ICU expansion.

"You can't get very many people in there," Dr. Miles said. "The rooms were too small to start with when we first opened the hospital (over 30 years ago)."

Dr. Miles said in situation such as "code," it is difficult to have needed equipment and personnel in the room.

"It's just not big enough," he said.

Expansion of the ICU "is one of the things I see as a positive," Dr. Miles told the board.

"There's things we need to add to our hospital," he said. "For years, we've had \$3 million worth of plans that we've spent money on, but we've never done anything. We never seem to get it done.'

"I think this is a good move," Dr. Miles definitely needs to be expanded."

Dr. Cooper relayed a recent situation during which an ICU patient's bed had to be turned "sideways" to allow access.

She said she fully supports anything which "improves patient care," and said ICU expansion is "most definitely" needed.

Branco told the board he would like to present "an actual bid proposal...(and) timeline...so the board can make an informed decision."

'We are likely to be able to do this using COVID money," the administrator said.

Under the plan, the present two-room ICU would be expanded to two, larger rooms, Branco said.

"We don't have the staffing for four rooms," he said. "Let's do two rooms really well."

He said construction "would be fairly simple" since an existing wall could be "pushed out" into a grassy area.

Just before the game got underway, Jake entered the gym. Walking with a crutch. Arm in bandages and a sling. Nose splint in place. Eyes still black from the impact of the air bags. He took a seat on the bench. To cheer on his team.

It was a lesson for everyone in that gym-and for us who weren't there. Though he couldn't physically

participate, he did his part in cheering on his underdog team. His teammates were inspired by his presence. And. They. Won.


