“We’re getting invested here heavily,” he said. “We’re continuing to invest in Russell County.”

In other business, the council voted to enter a contract with Envivo Health to provide free COVID testing.

Envivo will give “free COVID testing for all city employees, council members, volunteers for our fire department...and all citizens of Russell

Springs,” Mayor Thomas said.

“It’s free to anybody that wants to do it,” the Mayor said. “It’s no cost at all for the city, nothing at all.”

The council voted unanimously to enter the contract.

Testing will reportedly be done at a facility on Lakeway Dr.

Councilman Larry D Skaggs said the testing may be of interest to citizens.

Mayor Thomas also announced the recent hiring of Amy Shirley as the new Safety Officer for Russell Springs.

The mayor said along with her new position, Shirley will still serve in an office management position for the Russell Springs Police Department.

“We’ve already had calls about how good she is doing out in the community,” Thomas said.

The mayor said Shirley will be conducting duties such as funeral escorts, and enforcing parking in the city.

“I think that’s something the city has needed for some time,” Skaggs said.

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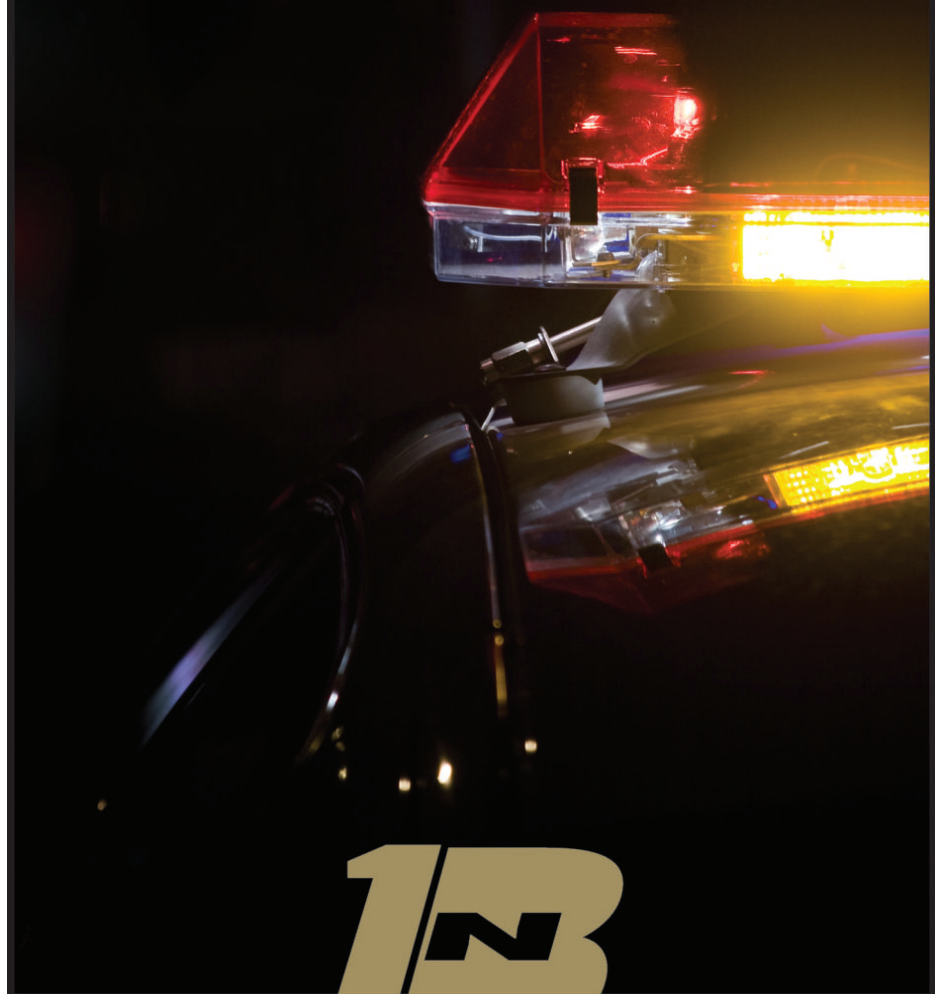
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
