City Cites Progress

Russell Springs is on the move, Mayor Eddie Thomas said.

Last Thursday, at the regular monthly meeting of the Russell Springs City Council, Thomas spoke about new businesses coming to the city, and signs of progress through several construction projects.

“We’ve got a lot of stuff going on,” the mayor said. “We’ve got three buildings under construction right now in the city limits, and we’ve got some other stuff coming in the future.”

Thomas cited construction of a large warehouse for Bennett’s Carpet, a new Head Start building, and future coffee shop Java Springs.

Positive and progressive economic news was bolstered by a visit to the council by entrepreneur Brad Vaughn.

So far, Vaughn has built Laker Laundry and Hop, Skip ’n JUMP behind Northridge Shopping Center, and has a storage facility under construction.

At Wolf Creek Dam

Corps Plan Would Replace Spill Gates

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is considering a plan to replace all 10 spillways at the Wolf Creek Dam.

Last week, the Corps Nashville District Office’s Project Planning Branch said an “Environmental Assessment” (EA) has been prepared regarding repairs at the dam.

“The purpose of the EA is to evaluate potential effects of the proposed replacement of the spillway tainter gates and implementation of a risk reduction measure,” Project Planning Branch Chief Craig D. Carrington said.

The report contains two considerations: A “No
