RCH employees get pay increase

All non-contract employees at the Russell County Hospital are getting a raise.

Last week, at a special, called meeting of the Russell County Hospital (RCH) Board, a suggestion by returning CEO Scott Thompson led to a 2.5 percent "across the board" pay increase for all non-contract workers.

Thompson, who served as CEO at the hospital during 2018-2019, said the increase is a way to show appreciation for employees, and combat heavy recruitment in the healthcare field.

"You've got three choices," he told the board. "One of them is do nothing, one of them is some sort of lump sum that we can do it once and call it done and be finished with it...(or) we can do some sort of percentage... which is what we feel is best."

Facing recent nursing shortages and retention issues, the hospital recently offered incentives such as
