meet Marti, tour the facility, and register for classes.

Students could choose classes for tap, ballet, jazz, acrobatic tumbling, pre-school tap, ballet, and tumbling, and adult tap, ballet, and "excerdance."

And so with 35-40 students, The Dance Shoppe began.

They quickly out-grew their original location.

With humor, Terry recalled a unique situation with being located close to a feed mill.

"I remember when chickens showed up when the kids were dancing one afternoon and walked right in," she laughed.

Marti went on to rent a couple more buildings before finally saving enough to purchase the building in which she is now located.

"It was the old pool room," Terry said. "I believe there's still a bullet hole in the front window."

The new location was quickly readied for her students.

Her parents, Corky and Irma Sallee, laid tiles in the now Dance Shoppe iconic shape of a ballerina that is still there.

Throughout the years The Dance Shoppe grew and hundreds of children were given the opportunity to dance.

One of those dancers stayed with the studio and continues on now.

"Lifetimer" Lisa Gosser started with Ms. Marti eager to learn.

"The Dance Shoppe and I have shared many wonderful recitals, halftime shows, special event appearances, Nutcracker and Christmas productions together," Lisa said.

"I started teaching gymnastics in 1990 and never stopped (only to have children)," she said. "This is my 40th Recital. You learn so much more than dance and gymnastics at the DS, you learn commitment, loyalty, dedication, strong work ethic something I've carried with me to adulthood."

Jamie McQueary is another student that developed a love of dance under Marti's tutelage.

"I have been a part of

"The Dance Shoppe" for 39 years," she said. "It is by far one of the greatest loves of my life. Miss Marti has taught me discipline, resilience, dedication and so much more. The one thing that's never changed is my love for this studio and Martha Sallee."

Inspired by Ms. Marti, students like Jamie and Jessica Critz have even discovered a love of teaching and have gone on to become educators themselves.

"It's difficult to find the words to describe someone that has had such a lasting impact on your life," Jessica said.

With the 40th annual recital approaching, Zach looks back with deep love and gratitude for his aunt and the legacy she has created.

"I'm forever thankful for Marti and the dream she had 40 years ago," Zach said.

"She has taught me so much more than dance and gymnastics," he said. "She's taught discipline, respect, responsi-

"Marti has been a huge part of my life since I was ten years old," she said. "Thirty years later she is so much more than a dance teacher, a mentor, or an employer. She is family. Her dedication to The Dance Shoppe helped me to learn how to not be afraid to have high expectations for myself and those around me. She was also the first person to see that I had potential teaching kids. I often tell people that I learned how to be an effective teacher years before I graduated from college. I learned by watching her and trying my best to make her proud. Those years teaching tiny dancers at The Dance Shoppe ultimately led to my career in education."

Now, 40 years after its inception, The Dance Shoppe employees 16 instructors - including Marti's sister, Patty Grider, and nephew Zach Grider.

"She's taught my kids responsibility and hard work and not to quit when things get tough," Patty said.

With hundreds of performers, the annual recital outgrew local venues and is held at the Center of Rural Development in Somerset.

"Ms. Marti's Mixtape" will be performed this Saturday, June 25th in Somerset at Noon CDT.
