One official in each sport is named "Outstanding Official of the Year" for their sport in appreciation of their dedication and service to schools and student-athletes across the state.

Jospeh Phillips started out running the timing console at high school meets for the Russell County High School Swim Team.

He soon took his test to become a swimming official and became a Level

2 KHSAA Swim Official and has been officiating for many years.

Phillips has been a valuable asset to the RCHS Swim Team, serving as head official, as well as organizing and communicating with teams across the state in hosting the Laker Fall Preview, Region 3 Swim Championships, and KHSAA Semi-State meets.

"He is highly respected by coaches and officials across the commonwealth and Russell County High School is blessed to have him," RCHS Swim Team Coach Glenda Prater said.

Jospeh is married to Dianna Toole Phillips and together they have three children, Ashten, EmmaRae, and Jacob, all former or current swim team members.

This season's team had nine seniors.

"The most I've ever had," Rexroat said. "But this year, this group of nine seniors not only won the region, but they made a big impact on everybody's life associated with baseball. They've had not only an excellent year, but their whole baseball career (including Babe Ruth play) has been successful. All of these guys are going to go on to be something in their lives. They're all going to be successful."

Rexroat said the team rose to any and every challenge.

"They (seniors) started with COVID as sophomores and didn't get to play," Coach Rexroat said. "We didn't have a whole lot of experience going into the junior year."

"When you really think about it, they missed 22 months of baseball," he said. "We played our last game in 2019...and we didn't come back til their junior year. They put in a lot of work to get where they were."

"There was ups and downs, there was adversity along the way," Rexroat said. "I'm very proud of them."

The Lakers compiled a best-ever season record of 31-7, and fell 11-1 against Saint Xavier, of Louisville, in the state championship game last month.

Coach Rexroat said many elements of the championship pursuit "were awesome."

He fondly remembered a post on social media by the Kentucky High School Athletic Association (KHSAA) showing a huge Russell County fanbase in attendance with the phrase, "When the whole county has your back."

"That picture there... of all those people...was so amazing, so special," he said. "It meant a lot."

Among those fans was former teacher and school superintendent Brooks Bates.

Bates was a member of the 1957 Russell County Baseball team who made it all the way to the state.

"Brooks has been to a lot of our games," Rexroat said. "He is a big Lakers supporter through all the years. It was just special to look up in the stands and see somebody from that team that made the Final Four, and here we are in 2022, and he's up there cheering us on."

Rexroat said it was an honor to have Bates, and teammate Lloyd Coffey attend the banquet.

"We're glad to have them here," Coach Rexroat said.

Coffey and Bates were presented baseballs autographed by

members of the Laker Baseball team.

Rexroat said Russell County Baseball, which began over six decades years ago, is steeped in tradition.

"Sixty-five winning seasons in 65 years is really great for our program," he said. "From 1955 to 2022 we have so many memories to be proud of."

The coach praised the Russell County School Board "for their vision," the community "for their support," and parents and guardians for their commitment to raising exceptional student athletes.

"They (students) have to have something established before we get them at the high school level," Rexroat said.

The Laker Baseball Varsity team, Junior Varsity, and Middle School teams were all recognized at the banquet.

In closing, Rexroat reminded players of their legacy.

"The memories you made, the ride you put us on...we'll never forget it," Rexroat said. "This county will remember you guys, the whole team, for many years to come."
