Back in December, local weather expert Daniel Wilson was well aware of a dangerous situation brewing in western Kentucky.

"We'd been watching it for several days," Wilson, Lead Forecaster/Owner of the Storm Alert Center, said. "We knew the conditions

were right for something. We knew it was going to be bad, but nobody knew it would be that bad.'

On that fateful day of December 10, 2021, Janssen Lindsey, a single mother of three, lost her Benton, KY. home to a tornado.
