"Right now there are very few such volunteers in Russell County, and we would very much like to see that number increase," Tom Reaugh, Senior Meteorologist with the National Weather Service, Louisville said.

"Anyone can let the National Weather Service (NWS), as well as universities and other agencies, know how much rain or snow fell in their backyard by joining the Community Collaborative Rain, Hail, and Snow Network -"CoCoRaHS." he said. "CoCoRaHS (www.cocorahs. org) helps meteorologists and researchers study the variability of precipitation across Kentucky, Indiana, and the rest of the nation.'
