#### **ORDINANCE NO. 22-06**

AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING TO THE CITY OF JAMESTOWN TERRITORY AS SET FORTH BELOW AND DESCRIBED IN THE ATTACHED EXHIBITS, AS DESIRABLE TO ANNEX BY THE CITY, AND PURSUANT TO KRS CHAPTER 81A AND ALL OTHER APPLICABLE LAW;

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JAMESTOWN, KENTUCKY:

#### I. PURPOSE OF ORDINANCE/COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE LAW

This Ordinance sets forth the Annexation of the subject property, which the City of Jamestown, Kentucky determines to be suitable for annexation, and further all property owners have given their consent in writing as attached hereto.

#### II. REQUIREMENTS FOR ANNEXATION SATISFIED BY THE CITY

The subject unincorporated territory is contiguous to the City Limits, is territory that is urban in character or is suitable for urban development without unreasonable delay; further, the included and described territory that does not already contain such infrastructure is part of the City's future development and growth plans. Therefore, the growth of the City's corporate boundaries and infrastructure into the subject territory is not a mere speculation that services may be provided in the future, but a solid and existing plan of which the City is financially capable of providing which will benefit the entire County and all communities.

#### III. CURRENT MUNICIPAL VALUE OR PURPOSE

Pursuant to applicable case law interpreting Kentucky Annexation Laws, the City of Jamestown may annex territory in strips, otherwise known as, and hereafter described as, "corridors", if said territory has a concrete and tangible municipal value or purpose existing at the time annexation is sought. The City of Jamestown, by and through the City Council, herein states and declares that the City of Jamestown has the required concrete and tangible municipal value or purpose for annexing the subject territory (See Section II above for additional information).

#### IV. DESCRIPTION OF TERRITORY

Please see Exhibit "A" (Description, Plat and additional description) which contains an accurate description of the annexed territory pursuant to KRS 81A, attached hereto and incorporated herein in full by reference.

BEING a Plat named Sonny's Landing Boundary Survey filed in Plat Cabinet 5, Slide 1650, in the Russell County Clerk's Office, Jamestown, Kentucky.

Also being a part of the same property conveyed to Jackie Aaron, Sue Aaron, Chad Aaron and Amy Aaron by Deed from Joseph Aaron and Sandy Aaron dated September 15, 2021 of record in Deed Book 362, Page 180, in the Russell County Clerk's Office, Jamestown, Kentucky.

### V. SEVERABILITY

If any part of this ordinance is deemed by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unenforceable or unconstitutional, the remaining provisions of this ordinance shall continue in full force and effect.

# VI. FORCE AND EFFECT


This ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon passage by the City Council, approval by the Mayor, and publication according to law.

# "Fore" against cancer

The truck rolled into the parking lot, and its occupants filed out - stretching and yawning from a long trip.

Four men ambled into the Lakewood County Club, and minutes later came out swinging...for a cause and a cure.

Last Thursday, members of "Golfing Kentucky for a Cure" visited Russell County as part of their unique approach to cancer research and awareness.

"I lost my dad to cancer in 2007," Mike Wright, creator/organizer of Golfing Kentucky for a Cure, said. "He was just a great guy...a barber, a magistrate in Trigg County, and everybody knew him. He wasn't famous or flashy... he was just one of the best people you'd ever meet in your life."

Wright, of Cadiz, wanted to find a way to honor his father "and fight cancer at the same time."

"So, I said, 'I'm gonna play every golf course in this state, and raise money for cancer research,' " he said.

A former high basketball school coach, Wright recalled people labeling his plans as "impossible."

"I said, 'I can't do it in two weeks...but I can do it in a few years," he said. "I started out, and I called every county in the state. I talked to the judge executives, I talked to the golf courses."

"I may be the only person who knows this," Wright laughed, "but there were 241 courses in the state when we started. There were 15 counties that didn't have a course."

Wright said he and some friends "started playing" a few courses, "but I got so busy that we kinda took a break."

"But something happened," he said.

Crittenden County Football Coach Al Starnes ("The Big Guy," as Wright calls him) had retired, and moved near Wright.

"He's a cancer survivor...he had colon cancer," Wright said, "so he had the same passion I had."

Mike McGill, a neighbor who survived prostate cancer, joined the formidable effort, and soon these men connected through cancer committed themselves to conquer the Commonwealth.

"We started a website, we got business cards...and we have been mowing them down," Wright proudly proclaimed.

With last week's round at Lakewood, "we will have completed 78 counties out of 120," he said.

This week the group hopes to visit several counties in eastern Kentucky.

"That'll be a seven county trip," Wright said.

And things are going well.

"We've got over \$12,000 in the bank," Wright said. "We couldn't do it without the courses. The courses let us play for free."

"But we still pay," he explained.

Monies are paid into a bank, then "signed on to by our Relay for Life people, which legitimizes it... for accountability."

"When we're done with it, it all goes to cancer research," Wright said. "It'll be a drop in the bucket in the fight against cancer, but it'll help some, and maybe someone will see what we did and have an idea that 'Hey, they did that, we can do this.'"

Another interesting aspect of the project is "after we play, we try to go to a local restaurant...no chains, as mom and pop as we can get."

"We have met some of the best people in the world in the places we've been," Wright said.
