September 20, 2012

September 19, 2002

Ramona R. Luttrell was appointed chairperson of the National Business Women's Week for the Kentucky Federation of Business and Professional Women.

Jamestown Assistant Police Chief Rufus Shearer took the fingerprints of Julia Wooldridge, eight, at a safety unit exercise at Jamestown Elementary. The fingerprint cards were sent home with parents.

September 23, 1982

A trio of horseback riders stopped to camp in Russell County on their way from Wyoming to Williamsburg, Virginia.

The pumpkin selling season was just getting underway, and Carlos Mann was ready with his field of 500 pumpkins.

Denise Miller, of Jamestown, won the annual Ladies Invitational Golf Tournament at the Monticello Country Club.

Russell Springs Police Chief Roger Pierce reported one man had been charged with bootlegging

on Main Street in Russell Springs.

September 21, 1972

Three masked bandits entered the home of Mr. and Mrs. Lilburn Voils and robbed the couple at gun point.

The Russell County Homecoming Parade was held in Jamestown and Russell Springs.

Kaptain Karl, with the National Child Safety Council, presented a program on child safety at Russell Springs Elementary. KSP trooper Arlis Hale was also in attendance.

Nolan Whittle, Sandy Chumbley, and Greg Grider were winners at a golf tournament held at Lakewood Country Club. Club President Charles Gore presented the trophies.
