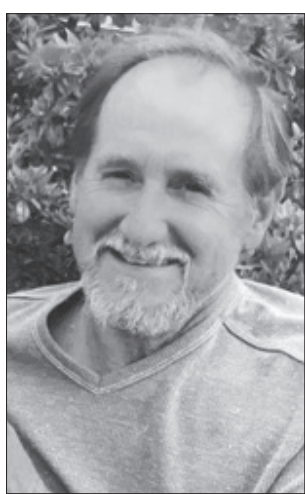


Edward "Ed" Wayne Blakeman, 64

On Dec. 4, 1956, an extraordinary twist of fate brought four music legends together for an unforgettable night at Sun Records in Memphis, Tenn.

"Million Dollar Quartet," which relives that night when Johnny Cash, Jerry Lee Lewis, Carl Perkins and Elvis Presley came together for one of the greatest jam sessions ever, comes to Campbellsville University's Russ Mobley Theater, 114 University Drive, Campbellsville, Ky., June 30-July 4.

Performance times June 30, July 1 and July 4 are 7 p.m. Performance time July 2 is 6 p.m., and performance time July 3 is 2:30 p.m.

"Million Dollar Quartet" is presented by Campbellsville University's Department of Theatre and Dance, Town Hall Productions and Heritage Children Services.

The musical, which was nominated for a Tony Award, "brings that legendary December night to life with an irresistible tale of broken promises, secrets, betrayal and celebrations that is both poignant and funny," a synopsis of the musical explains.

The family has asked that expressions of sympathy take form of donations to the Tartars Chapel Cemetery Fund, which can be made at the funeral home.

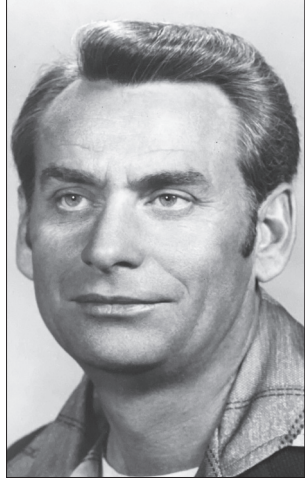

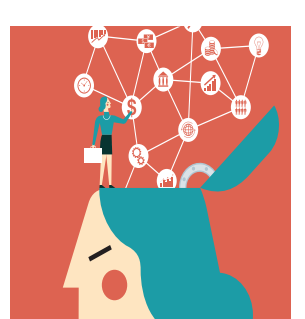
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How to Change Your Mind
