Sept. 26, 2012
House in a day - Over 200 volunteers built a home on Fry Ridge for sisters Sue Hall and Martha Christie Saturday.

Linemen certification - Cody Houchens and Patrick Stone earned their lineman certification through Kentucky Community and Technical College System.

Homecoming queen - The Green County High School Homecoming Queen was Brianna Scott.

Miss Cow Days - Shelby Pettey, Jamestown, was chosen the 2012 Miss Cow Days.

Sept. 25, 2002
Accident injures Moon - Joshua M. Moon was injured when his vehicle overturned on Russell Creek Hill. Wet pavement is cited as the cause.

City accepts Square plan - After rejecting the original plan, the Greensburg City Council adopted a redesigned plan for the city Square.

Cleaning a dump site - Green County Fiscal Court accepted a \$124,500 bid to clean up the six-acre Buck Rub illegal dump site. Approximately 90,000 tires have been taken from the site.

Two injured - Jo Anna McCubbin was seriously injured in a two-vehicle accident on Highway 61. Troy M. Akin was also injured.

Tax bills mailed - A total of 1,100 city property tax bills have been mailed. The projected revenue is expected to be \$78,000.

Cow Days proceeds - The reported income received from Cow Days events was: ham breakfast, \$1,584;

rides, \$1,197; nickel pitch, \$78; movies, \$255; popcorn sales, \$440; booth rental, \$1,910; and milking Annie, \$300.

Greensburg sellers sell, shoppers shop: Kids Consignment Sale returns to Elizabethtown for a record event

The area's largest seasonal children's consignment sale is preparing to host their record setting one-week-only pop-up consignment store next week and many Green County families are involved in the setup, selling, and of course... shopping.

The one-stop shopping experience will fill the Bluegrass Sportsplex in Elizabethtown with children's items, all for sale on behalf of over 1000 families from several Central Kentucky counties. Sellers and shoppers travel from well over an hour away to participate in the sale.

Just like the closets, toyboxes, garages, and basements of the families that sell their outgrown items at the Kentucky Kids Consignment Sale, the sale itself has been busting at the seams for the past several years. The business began with 30 sellers in 2004. This fall marks the fifth season that the sale will be held at the Bluegrass Sportsplex and is the first time that over 1000 families have signed up to consign their outgrown items.

The facility offers 50,000 square feet to

showcase the infant to tween clothing, shoes, toys of all types, sports equipment, books, nursery and toddler furniture, baby gear and more including household furniture & home decor items.

After a few days of setup, the event will be open to the public for shopping. Most of us are well aware that kids grow out of their belongings long before they are worn out. Kentucky Kids Consignment Sales sees this as a wonderful opportunity for parents and grandparents to clean closets, make some extra cash, and shop for new and like-new children's items in a way that keeps products and packaging out of landfills and also supports another family.

All items for sale are consigned by individual area families who prepare, tag and price their own items at home using an easy online tagging system, which also tracks sales each day of the event for the seller to view. Sellers choose whether to discount items on the final day of the sale event whether they want unsold items returned at the end of the sale or donated to local community organizations.

Items are displayed with all similar sizes and types together to create an enormous store. Sellers do not remain with their own items during the sale which cuts down on the face to face interaction required by individual garage sales or online buy/sell/trade groups.

The upcoming Kentucky Kids Consignment Elizabethtown Sale will be the fall/winter event, featuring warm clothing, Halloween costumes, winter coats, and holiday wear in addition to all the other bargains available.

The sale will be open for shopping:

Thursday, September 22 from 9 am to 8 pm ET

Friday, September 23 from 9 am to 4 pm ET

Saturday, September 24 from 9 am to 4 pm ET, with selected remaining items half price

No ticket is required and there is no admission charge to enter at these times.

Shoppers are not permitted to bring in purses, diaper bags, or backpacks that larger than an 8.5 x 11 sheet of paper. Empty tote bags may be brought in. More details be

Jack Gupton recently received his license as a Kentucky Funeral Director and Embalmer.

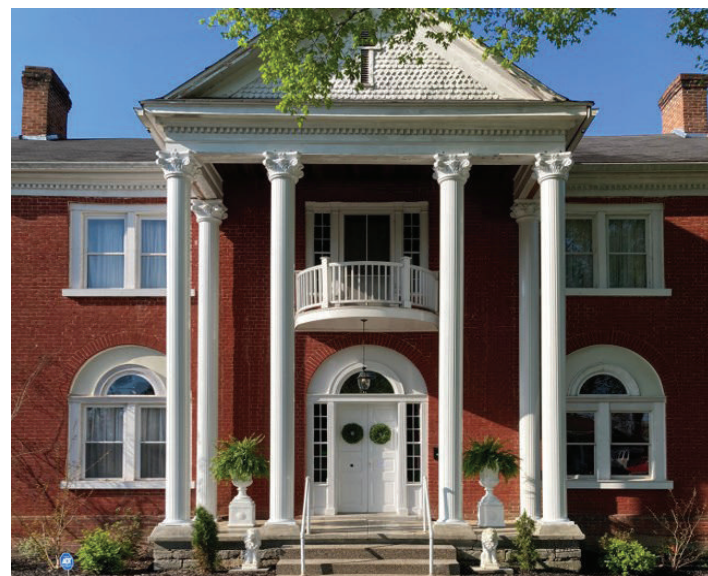
