

Garland C-Wood Wright, 84


Mr. Garland C-Wood Wright of Campbells-ville, the son of the late George William and Zelma (Moran) Wright, was born March 30, 1938 in Green County, and departed this life on Saturday, Nov. 19, 2022 in Louisville at the Norton Hospital. He was 84 years of age.

He had made a profession of faith in Christ and was of the Baptist Faith.

He enjoyed fishing, making children smile and laugh and was an avid UK fan, but always looked forward to his daily visits to McDonalds.

Besides his parents, he was preceded in death by his wife: Mamie Allyene (Bright) Wright; a sister and brother: Dorothy Elizabeth Judd and Homer Shively Wright; his step-mother: Lucille Sweeney Wright and a step-brother: Jesse Peppers.

Survivors include two brothers: Fred Wright of Campbells-ville and Jerry Wright and wife Jeanie of Bowling Green; four sisters: Peggy Mont-

The funeral service was held Tuesday, Nov. 22, 2022 in the chapel of the L.R. Petty Funeral Home with burial in the Green County Memory Gardens at Summersville.

Julia LeVert Buckner was born on July 10, 1874 in Green County. Sadly, she only lived to be 31 years old. She was the youngest child of William Stanton "Stant" Buckner and Mary Wood Edwards Buckner.

Older siblings of Julia were John Aylett, Lucy Elizabeth, Ann Edwards, Louisa Stanton, Eleanor Ulysses, William Richard, Mary Catherine, Velottie Bell, Alberta Lindsey Duke, and Horace Stewart Buckner.

Julia was just shy of her fifth birthday when her mother passed away. Mary left a will, leaving her property to Stant in trust to their children with provisions to care for all their minor children. It was her wish that Stant remain in their home and raise the children until they married or reached age 21.

At only 15 years old, Julia married William Maston Clark, age 22. They were wed at the home of W. L. Buckner by Rev. W. H. C. Sandidge on February 5, 1890.

William was born in Texas in 1869. His parents, Joseph R. and Martha Clark, had moved there from Metcalfe County for a few years. The family came back to Metcalfe by 1870, then to Green County by 1880.

Julia and William's first child, George Hershel, was born in March 1891. Their only daughter, Eleanor, came next in May 1893. Twin boys, Ray and Roy, were born in January 1896. Three more boys followed. Horace Stanton arrived in May 1898, Carlos Beckham in January 1901, and lastly, Rollin Buckner Clark in September 1903.

They lived in southern Green County near Exie where Julia kept house and took care of the children while William farmed to support them.

When her father died in 1898, Julia inherited his interest in the family home place. He also left her his horse, a bedstead and bedding from the parlor room, a red cow, a cherry bureau, a large cherry press, a buggy, and the Family Record. She also received part-interest in his clothing,

book library, and lots of hogs and cattle.

Julia was reported to have pulmonary trouble in late July 1905 and not doing well. She passed away a few weeks later on August 24, most likely from tuberculosis. At the time of her death, the children ranged in age from 14 down to 23 months.

The widowed William never remarried. In 1910, all the children remained with him. By 1920, Eleanor, Ray, Beckham, and Rollin were still at home. Only Eleanor and Rollin were with William in 1930. The trio was living in Greensburg by 1940.

William had been in ill health for some years then his condition worsened about three weeks before his death. He died on March 30, 1946 following a cerebral hemorrhage.

Rollin never married. He suffered from tuberculosis of the spine which confined him to his bed for months before his death in 1952.

Hershel married Anna Lee Kelly. Their

children were Carl Vernon, Elsie, William Lee, Hobert, Julia, Naomi, and Royce. Hershel died in 1965 with 16 grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Horace married Mary Hamilton and they moved to Illinois in 1921. He died there in 1966 survived by five children, 20 grandchildren, and five great grandchildren.

Ray married Vallie Bagby. Their children were Bernita, Wood-

son, and Willard Maston. Ray died at Jane Todd Crawford Hospital in 1970 with five grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Roy married Alvia Perkins in 1916. They moved to Boulder, Colorado. He died in 1973 from a massive heart attack in Texas where they had traveled to attend the funeral of their son-in-law. Roy was survived by three daughters, six grandchildren, and one great granddaughter.

Eleanor never married. She spent a great deal of her life caring for others. She died at the hospital here in 1982 following a brief illness.

Beckham married Zelpha Whitlock in 1924. Their children were LeVert, Alberta Mildred, Carlos, and Eleanor. Beckham died at Greensburg in 1997 with five grandchildren, 11 great grandchildren, and one great-grandchild.

Julia LeVert Buckner Clark may not have lived a long life, but in her 31 years she helped to build a large, loving family that carries on near and far.
