Samuel Stout to be topic of CWRT this month

Brad Quinn of Suwanee, Georgia, will present “Confederate Surgeon, American Hero – Dr. Samuel Hollingsworth Stout” to the Washington Civil War Round Table Monday evening, March 28 at 6 p.m.

Quinn will explain how Samuel Stout, an intelligent and operationally brilliant surgeon, developed medical procedures that saved many Confederate soldiers during the Civil War. The procedures were so effective that they saw continued use through the First World War.

According to Vanderbilt’s special collections and University archives, Samuel Hollingsworth Stout was born in Nashville on March 3, 1822, as the son of a carriage factory owner and politician. He graduated the University of Nashville with an A.B. degree in 1839, and received his M.D. degree in 1848 from the University of Pennsylvania.

At the outbreak of the Civil War, Stout enlisted in the Confederate Army and was granted a commission as major of cavalry May 17, 1861. He served as regimental surgeon of Colonel John C. Browns Third Tennessee Regiment, and later was placed in charge of the Gordon General Hospital in Nashville in November of 1861.

Before the end of the war, Stout oversaw all Confederate hospitals in the states of Georgia, Alabama, and Tennessee. It is of significance to note that he kept

all of these hospitals open after the war until 1866, so that the sick and wounded Confederate soldiers could be taken care of.

After the war, Stout was instrumental in establishing the medical schools at Emory University, Baylor University, and at the University of Texas. He also became the first Superintendent of Public Schools in Atlanta.

The presentation will be held at The Women’s Club located at 108 North Alexander Avenue in Washington, Georgia.
