ping up at East Prairie. At TCHS, they are currently completing demolition. It was noted that they are currently on schedule, with plans for teachers to return on August 10 and students on August 16.

East Prairie Principal Jared Vanausdoll then provided his report to the board. He began with a big thank you to all of the staff for their hard work during the school year, and especially the last week of school. He thanked Mrs. Brandenburg for all of her hard work with getting students schedules for next year, the summer staff for all of their work at the school, and to the board members who attended promotion.

Following, Tuscola High School Principal Steve Fiscus gave his report to the board. He congratulated TCHS student Chris Boyd for placing second in shot put at the IHSA State Track & Field meet, as well as all of the other athletes who qualified. He sent a big thank-you to the board, staff, and all others who attended graduation. Fiscus also sent a thank you to all who helped with all of the events that last week of school. He noted that he is excited to see all of the upgrades at the school, that the high school gym will close in July to refinish the floor, and that fall sports will begin on August 8. Fiscus stated that freshman orientation is tentatively scheduled for August 9 at 7 p.m., and that the first day of school is set for August 16.

North Ward Principal Jason Wallace then gave his report to the board. He noted that the school finished up the year strong, and thanked all for making it possible. Wallace also stated that schedules were finished up for students and that he hoped that they would have all staff hired soon.

Superintendent Gary Alexander followed with his report. He stated that it has been a great year for sales tax money, with the school receiving \$899,144.82 this year. He noted that these additional funds have been helpful with finances and capital improvement projects. Alexander stated that summer work is moving at a good pace, with the school crew working at North Ward now and OMNI on a good track with projects. He noted that three board members had expressed interest in the annual joint conference and had been registered. He sent a reminder that the federal government had not reinstated their free breakfast and lunch programs, so students who did not fall under the guildenes would have to pay in the upcoming school year. Alexander also reminded all that the referendum for voting for board members was on this year's ballot. He noted that if it is passed and board members are moved to be voted at-large, that all members will be up for re-

She didn't stop there Nebraska was the next victim for the hard throwing righty in the Regional Championship game on her home turf scattering five hits out over seven innings. The next week she collected the win after throwing the first five innings in a Super Regional win over Clemson clinching the Cowgirls spot in the World Series and in the words of exuberant and proud dad Scott Day "Back to OKC Baby, Back to OKC, She's going to the world series."

You can say it was a dream come true, that however doesn't scratch the surface of what Morgan and her family put into this accomplishment. As her coach in high school and a witness to her college career four words come to mind, quest, perseverance, passion and family. days but through it all Morgan persevered. And right there with her every step of the way were her parents Scott and Kirsten along with brothers Griffin and Mason fueling the passion. If you know anything about travel sports it's a family affair and for the Days it was a journey they will never forget.

She was part of three regional championships at Tuscola, an All CIC First Team selection and part of an elite eight team her junior year, was the Herald and Review Player of the year her senior year and an All-Stater. At ISU she was named to the Missouri Valley Conference All Tournament Team in 2018, was second team All MVC in 19, was all preseason MVC in each

20 and was ranked seventh in the nation in strikeouts before COVID ended the year, and in 2021 collected First Team MVC honors, MVC Scholar Athlete accolades, and was named to the All-Mideast Region NFCA second team.

This year at OSU Morgan was named the Big 12 Pitcher of the week on March 8, and added to her collection of accomplishments a Big Twelve Championship Ring, an NCAA Regional Championship, an NCAA Super Regional Title, was named to the All Big 12 Tournament team and as mentioned earlier secured the Big 12 Tournament Most Outstanding Player award.

We had the privilege of eating breakfast with Mor-

gan one morning last fall in Stillwater after an Oklahoma State Football game the night before and witnessed first hand her passion for the sport and her new team. She predicted right then they would be in the World Series, she went on and on about how good her teammates and coaches were. She knew the Cowgirls returned one of the best pitchers in college softball from the year before and were getting an All American Transfer to the circle at the semester and her confidence in herself never waned. Morgan simply stated "they will make me better, and the team better," no time for selfishness in her world, just a neverending work ethic to get her a seat at the table.
