Monthly Traffic Safety Enforcement Report

The Lancaster County Sheriff's Office has officers working pursuant to three grants focused on traffic safety issues including impaired driving and speeding. The grants are federally funded and are administered through the Office of Highway Safety and Justice Programs of the South Carolina Department of Public Safety. The Impaired Driving Countermeasures Enforcement Project concentrates efforts on driving violations and behaviors corresponding with impaired driving. The Police Traffic Services Enforcement Project focuses on speeding drivers and those committing other traffic law violations which endanger the public. The Overtime Enforcement Project provides funds to pay deputies overtime for working special operations scheduled in conjunction with the impaired driving proj-

The first two grants each fund one deputy position, and all deputies certified in the administration of Standard Field Sobriety Tests may work the overtime grant as their schedules permit. All three grants require the sheriff's office to conduct multiple saturation patrols and traffic safety checkpoints throughout the grant periods. The grants also require the sheriff's office to participate in traffic safety campaigns sponsored by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and the South Carolina Department of Public Safety. The traffic services enforcement project also requires officers to make regular educational presentations on traffic laws to community. make regular educational presentations on traffic laws to community groups and organizations. All the grants require the release of information on grant activities to traditional and social media outlets.

Putting South Carolinians to Work:

On Wednesday, my colleagues and I voted to invest in education and workforce development to provide the tools and resources to get people jobs and help students, parents, and job seekers make informed career choices. H.3726, the Statewide Education and Workforce Development act, On The Horizon: Budget will deliver value-added services to business customers by collaborating with them to address skills shortages in priority industries and in-demand occupations and address obstacles to employment to increase labor participation. The goal of this bill is to eliminate duplication, improve efficiencies, and achieve a more coordinated approach in our workforce and education pipeline. We must prepare our future generations for whichever career path they choose, and this bill is a great starting point.

Celebrating Women in Hunting Budget Highlights



and Fishing:

The House unanimously passed H.3868, a bill declaring the second Saturday in November of each year as "Women in Hunting and Fishing Awareness Day".

The House unanimously passed S.361, a bill to remove the requirement for preapproval of construction contract extensions by the DOT Commission. Instead, it would require that the Commission ratify any extensions to construction contracts at their next scheduled meeting. This will help streamline the DOT contract process on important infrastructure projects around our state.

The House Ways & Means Committee wrapped up weeks of hearings and approved the preliminary 2023-24 state budget. This initial budget proposal (nearly \$14 billion) is a starting point and, while large, is fiscally conservative and focuses on our key government functions. The Full House will debate it next week before sending it to the Senate. I am committed to ensuring taxpayer dollars are spent wisely and in a way that directly impacts South Carolin-
