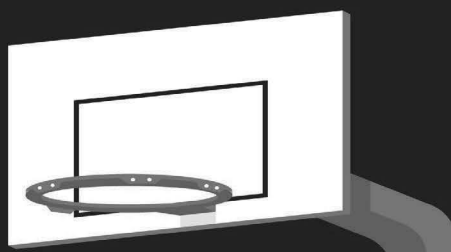

time.

This ‘Food for the Gods’ was served in bowls and with warm, buttered cornbread. The cornbread was baked in the oven - and, at breakfast, it became spoonbread. It tastes so good with warm maple syrup.

Grandma Ada had “Koolickers” only once. This also can be said for her Chitlins. They were disgusting...Koolickers are pickles soaked for a very long time in cherry or strawberry kool aid.

What Little Grandma lost with her Koolickers, she redeemed herself with her mouth-watering Ladyfingers dessert. They are ‘fingers’ of sponge cake with the very richest whipped cream. She added strawberries on the side. It was a real winner.

Plans for a practical community Christmas for Lake Worth were launched informally this morning with the endorsement of the presidents of every civic club in the city, both men and women’s organizations. Details are to be worked out at a meeting of the presidents to be held early next week at a time and place to be announced later.

A “practical Christmas,” is to be slogan of the citizens committee, not forgetting that toys and Christmas goodies go hand in hand with Christmas and practically where children are

concerned!

Arrangements for a survey of the city with the object of obtaining a list of those whom old Santa should provide for will be made when the civic club presidents hold their first meeting. Plans for the collection of funds necessary to defray expenses and a method of distribution will be worked out, also.

C. L. McCoy, Rotary: “A splendid idea, and never was there a better opportunity to render real service than now. The Community Christmas should become an established custom in Lake, Worth, and I am willing to do what I can to make it a year event.

Tamiami Link is Nearly Complete
Construction of the Tamiami Trail between Naples and Miami will be

Completed before January 1, it is anticipated by Fons A. Hathaway, chairman of the state road department.

Mr. Hathaway has completed surveying the Trail with Barron G. Collier, of New York, who has extensive interests in Collier county.

A rock barricade being erected on the canal side of the road to prevent motor accidents, will be finished by December 15, Dr. Hathaway said.

Contracts for new bridges across the Caloosahatchee river at Ft. Myers and Charlotte Harbor at Punta Gorda would be let November 27, he added and incomplete stretches between Naples and Bonita Springs and elsewhere will be finished at an early date.
