Dragons win 41-7

The high school football team rebounded from last week's loss to Hart County by soundly defeating West Jessamine 41-7 Friday night in Nicholasville.

The Dragon defense set the tempo of the game when they held West Jessamine to three plays and a punt on their first possession. "West Jessamine

was big everywhere," Head Football Coach Colt Phelps said. "They had been in the weight roomalot, but we didn't back down from them."

The Dragon offense was ready for their turn as well. After three consecutive first downs and just three and a half minutes later, Kelson McKinney punched the ball into the end zone for the first of his two touchdowns.

"We made so many mistakeslastweekthat it was easy to get down on ourselves," Phelps said. "We had to get back to the basics and do what we do well."

After the two teams swapped possessions once, West Jessamine prepared to punt again but Jake Bishop blocked the punt and Green County took over on the Colts' 13-yard line.

After moving the ball to the eight-yard line, quarterback Houston Hodges faked the handoff and ran the ball into the end zone. McKinney completed the two-point conversion and the Dragons led 14-0 still in the first quarter.

West Jessamine retaliated with their only touchdown of the night on a 10-yard TD pass with 11:08 to go in the second quarter. The PAT made the score 14-7.

Green County wasted little time in scoring again when Gage Bale scored a touchdown. Bishop's PAT was good, and

"The offense worked as a unit this week," Phelps said. "They were not playing as individuals. It was not just the offensive line but the whole team worked so much better in combination with each other."

The Dragons threatened again in the second quarter when they prevented West Jessamine from converting on fourth down and Green County took over on their own 19-yard line.

Big runs by McKinney and Jullian Seymour moved the ball to the Colts' 13yard line, but the rally ended there, and the half ended with Green on top 21-7.

"We had a short memory Friday night," Phelps said. "We didn't let our mistakes compound by focusing on them but instead we moved on."

The third quarter was just swapping possession until Seymour scored with 33 seconds left in the period. That made the score 27-7 in favor of the Dragons.

The fourth quarter was all Green County as they added two more touchdowns.

McKinney scored on a 52-yard TD run ly added the twopoint conversion.

Shively added a touchdown of his own with just over three minutesleftinthegame to give Green County the final 41-7 margin.

As a team, Green County racked up an incredible 517 yards, the most of any game so far this season.

Hodges threw the ball 16 times, completing nine of the passes for 130 yards. He scattered the passes to five different receivers. McKinney had two receptions for 34 yards. Caleb Scott had one reception for 32 yards. Seymour caught one pass for 30 yards. Bishop had three receptions for 22 yards and Austin

This is the fifth straight game in which the Dragons have faced a school that plays in a larger class. The only 2A teams that Green County plays this year are the district opponents—Clinton County, Metcalfe County and Monroe County.

Green County and LaRue County have a rich rivalry between their sports teams, but it's been a while since they played each other in football.

LaRue County owns a 17-7 advantage over the Dragons through the years.

The two teams have not faced each other since 2016 when LaRue won 48-20 in a home game for them. Prior to that game, the Dragons won the previous

five games in a row. That is in sharp

contrast to how the series began. Starting in 1962, LaRue won the first seven games and ten of the first 11 games.

"We are big rivals with LaRue in other sports," Phelps said. "That makes us hungry. We know we have to show up, ready to play every game."
