Local hunters can help manage deer numbers, feed the hungry

Deer hunters have a unique opportunity this season to help feed the hungry, manage herd numbers, reduce deer, automobile accidents and lessen crop damage.

In Green County, an area designated as a Zone One County by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife, hunters may harvest an unlimited number of antlerless deer through the purchase of additional tags. These tags are available to allow hunters to help manage and reduce the herd in an area that management personnel have determined to be at or above optimum populations.

Through the efforts of the nonprofit organization, Kentucky Hunters for the Hungry deer harvested can be donated to feed those in need of additional nutrition. Hunters may simply check in their deer receiving a confirmation number, field dress the animal, and deliver it to an approved processor, free of charge. The venison will be ground into burger and distributed to those in need.

This opportunity to donate a deer is absolutely FREE to the hunter. All processing fees are paid for through Hunter's for the Hungry.

Thanks to a cooperative effort between Kentucky Hunter's for the Hungry and the Adair County School District, Hunter's can now provide venison to be used to prepare meat sticks which will be distributed to students in need through the School's Family Resource Center.

Hunger is real in Kentucky and especially in school-age children. Green Countians are challenged to make available this much needed source of protein to those less fortunate, while managing a deer herd that is a renewable resource.

Purple Heart Plants

Purple heart plants have been a popular house plant for several years. They have even been used within summer annual outdoor plantings. The plant has a purple stem and purple leaves. The plant does very well in hanging baskets due to the vining growth of

the plant. Purple heart needs bright light. A Southern or Western facing window will provide this light requirement. Keep the soil evenly moist. If you do forget to water the plant, it can tolerate some drying out due to its succulent stems. Purple heart plants have pink flowers that bloom where its two leaves cross. They are not large flowers but do add a little pop of color to the plant. The purple heart plant usually gets about 8-12 inches

tall and vines to about 20 inches. Some purple hearts may become longer. Purple hearts are easy to propagate. Take tip cuttings and plant them in a moist potting medium. The cuttings can also be placed in water for roots to develop. An interesting cultivar of the purple heart plant is a variegated form that has light purple stripes.
