Nov. 22, 1963 Income survey - Green County families rank 73rd in the state with a total personal yearly income of \$11,590 in 1961. The UK Bureau of Business Research sponsored the survey.

History of New Hope Baptist Church

On the evening of Saturday, August 15, 1936, at the New Hope School in Green County, people of the community met to have a Sunday School class and church service. After the service, a business session was held of which Bro. Kelly Judd was appointed moderator. Sister Velma Workman was appointed clerk. A resolution was formed for a new church and the New Hope Baptist Church was established.

Those present at the meeting were charter members. They included: Mrs. Vacie Bagby, Mrs. Christeen Brown, Mrs. Vivian Russell, Mr. Rosenvelt McKinney, Miss Bulah Jeffries, Mr. Will Workman, Mrs. Vashti Hudgens, Mrs. Velma Workman, and Mrs. Mollie Jeffries.

The following day, a baptismal service was held and 11 candidates were baptized into the Fry Baptist Church. The doors of the New Hope Baptist Church were opened to those in attendance and 19 members joined the new church. Rev. R.A. Slinker, District Mis-

sionary, was present and he declared the body a Missionary Baptist Church.

For the congregation, a building was erected approximately six miles south of Greensburg off Hwy 68 on New Hope Road, near Exie. The State Mission Board of Kentucky Baptists gave fi-

nancial assistance for the building.

A deed for the one-half acre of land occupied by New Hope Baptist Church was conveyed to the church on March 15, 1950 by Velma Workman and her husband, Vester Workman, for the sum of one dollar.

By 1954, the church

had grown to 40 members. That year, services were changed from the first Sunday afternoon each month to Sunday nights.

Through donations and fundraising efforts, the church built an addition in 1988 consisting of restrooms and a Sunday School room.

New Hope Baptist Church has hosted countless revivals, homecomings, and singings over the years, always with an open invitation to everyone.

Pastors of the church have been Bro. E.T. Caffee, Bro. Bradley Wright, Bro. Mickey Pruitt, Bro. John Hornback, Bro. Robert Sylvester Wright, Bro. Edward Thompson, Bro. Albert Harper, Bro. Allen Durrett, Bro. Tom Downey, Bro. Roger Pointer, Bro. Herbert Wright, Bro. Cary “Red” Dunbar,

Bro. Ronnie Wilson, Bro. Greg Whitlow, and Bro. Casey Durrett. Since January 2023, Bro. Jonathon Meadows has served as pastor.

Currently the church has 26 active members, 96 members in all. They have an ever-growing building fund with hopes of constructing a new church in the future.

New Hope Baptist Church continues to make progress as it serves Christ in the community, just as it has for the past 87 years.
