September or after is the same as the spot market today. That will change and most farmers will store wheat and beans and gamble on an up market for the grain sometime later in the year.

About the only crop plans that might change are wheat and

soybeans. If the wheat is going in well this spring, farmers might consider continuing to plant it. If the spring drags on much longer, beans may well be the alternative crop for planting later in the spring.

Everything is different this crop year. But it is still surprisingly the same as every other spring here in Minnesota farm country.
