

**STREET FAIRS**

**October 1, 1898** – The Chicago Inter Ocean (Oct. 2, 1898) noted the free street fair and broomcorn show coincided with the harvest of the local broomcorn crop and that every incoming train was crowded with "choppers," or broomcorn cutters. The Inter Ocean reported the "chief feature" of the show was a broomcorn palace, which was described as the first edifice of the kind ever erected. The Paxton Record reported that everyone who saw the palace, which had a 45-square-foot ground plan and stood 60 feet high from the base to the top of the flag staff, was dazzled. The fair stretched five blocks along Main Street, filled with various stalls and livestock and poultry.

**June 22-27, 1903** – The Royal Carnival Company was contracted by the Knights of Pythias to hold a six-day event on Arcola streets on June 22-27. The fair featured a kinodrome – a "moving picture" machine that offered an exhibition of moving pictures which would have been a novelty to most people at that time. Also appearing was a snake eater, a two-headed woman, and a gigantic bull. The streets were lined with merchant booths and the popular Gibler's Band from Mattoon headed the Humboldt contingent in the parade. The Mattoon paper also reported that Chief Special Agent McCumsey of the Illinois Central and his force were on hand to help the local officers ward off graffers and pickpockets. The event was reported to be a "hummer."

**June 5-11, 1905** – The Lachman-Keetch Exposition Company was engaged for the 1905 street fair and offered "10 Monster Amusement Enterprises" which included the Roman Coliseum of the best circus acts featuring Little Sybil the Wonderful Child Artist, Fairy Land featuring La Rene in her Fire Fountain and Silver Dances, Ben Hur the Horse with the Human Brain, the Electric Colonnade of moving pictures, the Famous Troupe of Crystal Palace Glass Blowers, and the Keetch Family Unparalleled Combination of Aerial Sensations.

**HOME COMING FAIRS**  
**Aug. 3-7, 1909** – The Weekly Arcolian (Aug. 12, 1909) reported that Arcola's first Home Coming was a "colossal success." The fair offered "open hospitality, royal good fellowship, fine entertainment with ideal weather," all of which made the "meeting of old-time friends"

all the more enjoyable. The town was lauded for its management of the event. The town was elaborately decorated and celebrated Ohio Day, Illinois Day, Woodman Day, and Old Settlers Day. Entertainment included balloon ascensions, trapeze performances and other attractions, speeches, and musical performances. The biggest event was an automobile parade featuring "50 machines in line." The auto parade was led by car with a band playing and a car with a daintily clad female reception committee. The parade was a huge success.

**Aug. 13-17, 1914** – The Aug. 13, 1914, Weekly Arcolian announced the town was ready for the second big "Home-Coming Celebration" which offered "entertainment for the many Arcolans who are coming in on every train to greet the friends of long-ago." The fair celebrated Old Settlers Day, Fraternal Day, Bull Moose Day, Democratic Day, Republican Day, and Agricultural Day. Entertainment included the Gilmore Family Aerialists. Also performing were the Kami Kichi Japanese Juggling and Contortionists troupe, and aeronaut Professor Pearl Stuckey to perform balloon ascensions. The Arcola Band and other singers and musicians provided concerts. The fair also offered a fraternal parade, speeches, livestock shows, and baseball games. A special feature of the fair was an Alfalfa Parade, meant to showcase the uses of that crop and which was built along the lines of the original Broomcorn Palace built for the 1898 street fair.

**Aug. 5-7, 1920** – Ads for the 1920 Arcola Products and Home Coming Fair announced there would be "10 Free Acts Each Day." The Sullivan Band, Bethany Band, Gibler's Band from Mattoon, and Goodman's Band of Decatur all provided musical entertainment. Also performing were the Flying Wards aerialist act, a Big Animal Act, the Jamakami Japanese Acrobats, the Zayno Sensational Aerialists, LaTrobe Comedy Acrobats, and Captain Cook and his trained seals. The event offered concessions and "all kinds of rides and plenty of good shows, but no carnival." The event also offered a flyover of planes from Chanute Field (Rantoul). The Aug. 7, 1920, Decatur Daily Review reported that so many people drove from Tuscola to Arcola for opening night that the dust cloud that formed on the unrolled dirt roads between the two towns was so heavy

that "driving was rather dangerous."

**Aug. 5-7, 1926** – The event was held on the grounds of the East Side School. Ralph Miller's Amusement Company provided shows and rides, which included a three-abreast Merry-Go-Round, Giant Ferris Wheel, Glider, Merry Mix-up, and a 36-foot Kiddie Slide. The headline was the well-known Coon-Sanders Novelty Orchestra, the orchestra was billed as the "orchestra that made the radio famous," and was led by Kansas City musicians Carleton Coon and Joe Sanders. A dance floor under a water-proof tent was available for "park-plan" dancing each night for just 12 and half cents per couple per dance (park-plan dancing was so named for the pay-by-the-dance format used in amusement parks). Chicago Charleston Champions Rose and Joe Morache performed, along with the Sutcliffe Family acrobatic troupe, the Fearless Flyers High Trapeze and Casting act, Walter Stanton & Co. Giant Rooster Comedy Act, Kurtzo & Kurtz thrilling 90-foot pole balancing act, Brody & Delavan balancing act, and more. Attendance: More than 21,000 people.

**Aug. 8-10, 1929** – Wayne King and his Aragon Ballroom Orchestra, direct from the Aragon Ballroom in Chicago, was the dance band all three nights for park-plan dancing. Also providing musical entertainment was Strouts 17-Piece Military Hussar Band. Fifty-four entertainers were on the program, 24 in acts, 17 in the band, and 10 in the orchestra. Acts on the bill were the trapeze and acrobatic troupe the Sensational Four Lorenzos, aerialist Bee Starr, the Sun Fong Lin Company Chinese troupe of jugglers, Prestidigitation (magic), and Illusions, the Five Bracks Risley Artists (acrobats that juggle barrels or fellow acrobats on their feet while lying on their backs), Bruno Wiese & Company Comedy novelty act, and various others. Thomas Monahan was the general chair of the 1929 Home Coming Committee and Walter Reinheimer served as secretary.

**Aug. 1-3, 1935** – The 1935 Home Coming Fair was held on the East Side School grounds. Headlining the event was the 15-piece Ozzie Nelson's Orchestra, which played a three-day dance program on the park-plan. Nelson was staged in a tent just north of the school with a dance floor that accommodated 800 couples.

The Gooding Amusement Company provided 10 circus and vaudeville acts, and Al Sweet's Wings of the Century Band added additional entertainment. Southeast of the school was a broomcorn exhibit with broomcorn from three continents and all of the producing states in the U.S. on exhibit. A 150-automobile motorcade carried a delegation of visitors from Mattoon. The Aug. 8, Tuscola Journal said the Arcola Home Coming was a "Great Success in Quality as Well as in Magnitude."

**July 27-30, 1938** – Thomas Monahan chair, Walter Reinheimer, L. G. Engle, Frank Collins, Ed Smith, Ben Cox, Henry Moore, Paul Lindenmeyer, William Haley, H.C. Irle, and John Clisby. The event was held on the 22-acre campus of Arcola Township High School. The headline was movie star and band leader Tony Martin and his Orchestra, which presided over the Saturday night dance. The Ted Fio-Rita Orchestra played on opening night, and Clyde McCoy's Sugar Blues Orchestra played Thursday and Friday. Various local bands provided additional entertainment along with 20 free vaudeville acts.

Saturday night was the crowning of Broomcorn Queen. Twenty-six contestants came from all over Central Illinois and wore costumes made of broomcorn stalks. Arcola native Betty McClanahan was crowned queen by Tony Martin. A broomcorn palace, measuring 60 feet by 30 feet, was a notable attraction. The palace housed broomcorn exhibits from Arcola and surrounding areas, various states, South America, and Europe. Newspapers announced a record setting 32,000 people from 39 states were in attendance.

**July 31-Aug. 2, 1941** – The event was again held on the campus of Arcola Township High School. The Byers Brothers Carnival was contracted to provide shows and rides.

Headliner Lawrence Welk and his Champagne Music Orchestra, featuring Jayne Walton, straight from their recent engagement at the Trianon Ballroom in Chicago, provided dance music each night in a large tent on the school grounds. Frank Cervone's Miami Band provided music for nine circus acts, vaudeville shows, and serial features, and provided entertainment between acts. On display was a mammoth 40 feet by 160 feet soybean palace to showcase the increasingly popular crop. The

entire town was decked out with flags, bunting, and banners to welcome all visitors.

Also a big draw, visitors were able to view Arcola High School which had been badly damaged in a fire in the early hours of July 24 after being struck by an errant bolt of lightning.

**July 7-9, 1955** – The year 1955 marked Arcola's 100th birthday and the town celebrated with a three-day Arcola Centennial Homecoming fair. The event began with the sounding of bells, sirens, and horns and a ribbon cutting to start the parade. Each of the three days - themed Homecoming Day, Youths Day, and Farmers Day - offered carnival rides and free shows, food, speeches, presentations, exhibits, programs, and a Tractor Square Dance. Appearing at the fair were the Radio Station WLS Performers. Paul Karlstrom and his Orchestra, Johnny Bruce and his Orchestra, and Dick Cisne and his Orchestra provided music for dancing.

Local residents offered two performances of a "Days of Yesteryears" Pageant, which commemorated the founding and growth of Arcola in 100 years. The last day offered judging of the "Ladies of the Swish," and the "Brothers of the Brush." Elizabeth Carroll of Arcola, a senior at Arcola High School, was crowned Centennial Homecoming Queen.

**CHAUTAQUAS**

**Aug. 18-22, 1915** – Arcola's first Chautauqua had an auspicious opening due to the day's headliner, the renowned Helen Keller, author, disability rights and political activist, and lecturer, and her teacher, Mrs. Macy. A reported 1,000 people attended Keller's speech. The event offered five full days of programs such as the Royal Welsh Male Choir, performances by the Clifton Mallory players, the Tyrolean Alpine Singers and Yodelers, Victor Ilahi Kaksh to speak about his native India, Grossman's Philharmonic Orchestra, Captain Jack Crawford the poet and Scout, and many others.

**July 20-24, 1916** – Entertainment by the Royal Sextet (a novelty group), Grossman's Philharmonic Orchestra, Stratford Operatic Company, the Municipal Choir of Decatur, the Hawaiian Concert Company, and the Neopolitan Orchestra. Lectures were offered by Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, the pure food expert, a sermon on "Food and Fire" by Dr. Charles Sheldon, the "Jews Contributions to

Civilization" by Rabbi A. J. Messing, and "The Criminal in the Making," by Judge Frank Sadler.

**July 18-22, 1917** – Entertainment provided by Duggin Operatic Company, the Welch Quartette, All Americans, the Italian Sextet, and Goforth's Orchestra. Lectures provided by Bishop W.F. Oldham from South America, Judge Frank Sadler, Byron W. King, Joe R. Hanly, "Play Ball" by Dr. Clarke, Boys and Girls Program and Cartoons of Fun by Ash Davis. Also offered was the play "The Melting Pot," with Ruth Hemenway Shaw.

**July 5-9, 1918** – Entertainment included the Royal Scottish Entertainers and lectures were given by Joel W. Eastman. Event at the City Park.

**June 26-30, 1919** – The opening attraction was the Soldiers' Quartet and a lecture by Lew Harding of Seattle, Wash.

**Aug. 22-26, 1920** Program not available.

**June 25-29, 1921**  
 The June 30, 1921, Tuscola Journal reported that the Arcola Chautauqua program this year was "and exceptionally strong one." Program unavailable.

**June 23-27, 1922** – The highlight of the Chautauqua was the "Pageant of Peace" produced under the direction of Rachael Givens and featuring children from Arcola. Entertainment provided by Cleaver's Gypsies (singers), the Landis Brass Quintet, the Welsh Ladies Glee Singers, and the play, "The Shepherd of the Hills," produced by the Wales Players. Lectures included "Heather and Shamrock" and "Squeaks in the Social Machinery," by Professor M. H. Jackson, and "Man in the Making" and "Laughter and Tears" by Chaplain James Small.

**Aug. 14-18, 1925** – The most popular entertainment was J.W. Zellner, a character impersonator. Also entertaining the crowd was Ye Old Town Quartette and Wallace Amsbury, formerly with the Armour Institute of Technology in Chicago.

Three days after the 1925 Chautauqua, it was reported in the Mattoon Journal Gazette that "Arcola Loses Chautauqua." The Mutual Morgan Company, who produced the events failed to receive enough pledges for tickets for 1926.
