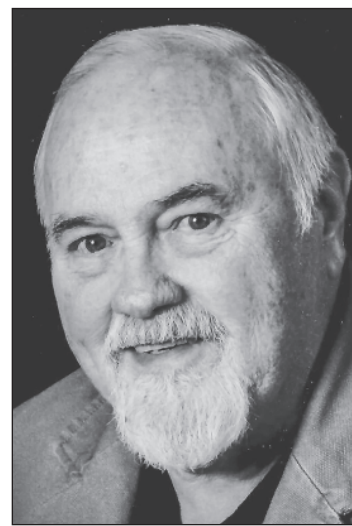
## Paul Bunting

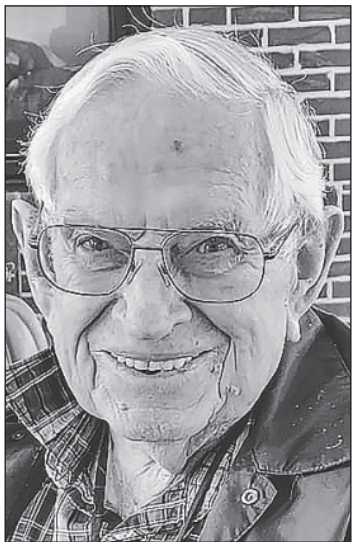

Lyle will be remembered for his kind heart, hard work, and love for his family and friends. His spirit will live on in the memories of those who loved him.

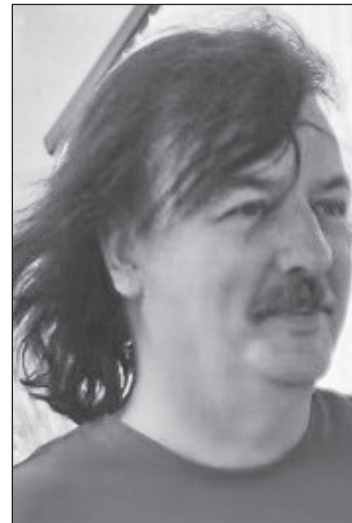
## Mark Ruyle
