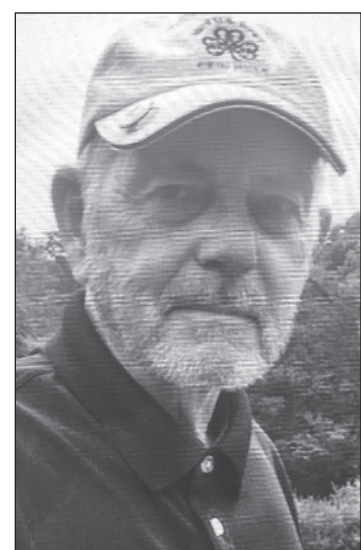
Delano Yeakel

Edna Nissley

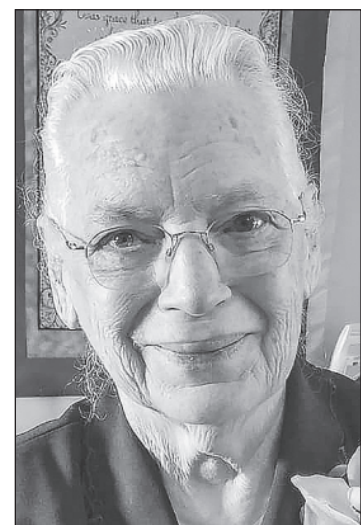
